

Flat-Rate Tuition and Summer Banked Hours

Let's say that you enrolled in 12 hours in the fall and are now enrolled in 17 hours. So, how many hours do you have in the bank for summer courses? What ex-

actly do the banked hours cover? What if you do not take classes in the summer, will you get a refund? You and many other students at OU have these same questions and more about flat-rate tuition.

Banked hours are based on 30 hours for the fall and spring semesters. For example, a student who takes 15 hours in the fall but only 12 hours in the spring has a total of 27 hours taken and will bank 3 hours for the summer. However, a student who takes 17 hours in the fall and 13 hours in the spring for a total of 30 hours has no hours in the bank for summer

courses. Students are allowed to bank up to 6 hours for the summer.

The costs that are coved by



hours that have rolled over for the summer are tuition and mandatory fees. Other fees are not and are paid for by the student based on how many hours they are taking during the summer.

Students receiving financial aid are eligible to use banked

hours for the summer. According to Brad Burnett, "If a student takes 12-14 hours they are charged for 15 (say in the Fall). Their Fall aid

would pay for the 15 hours. The 3 banked hours would then be paid for (with Fall aid) even though they are taking the hours in the summer."¹

Students with questions about their situation and Flat Rate tuition should see an Academic Counselor or contact the Bursar's office.
