



Each year, a special lecture is given in memory of Harry G. Fair, an outstanding OU alumnus. Harry G. Fair was born in Okmulgee, Oklahoma, on June 3, 1916. He received the B.S. in Chemical Engineering in 1939. He joined Phillips Petroleum Company in 1939 and worked his way up to Vice President for Supply and Transportation, with responsibility for world-wide exchange of crude oil and all transportation facilities. In 1966 he joined the M.W. Kellogg Company as Executive Vice President, in charge of all engineering activities and became Executive Vice President of Coastal States Gas Corporation from 1971 until the time of his death on July 27, 1974. Harry G. Fair was active in service to society and to his alma mater. He was a member of a number of professional societies and was a licensed professional engineer.

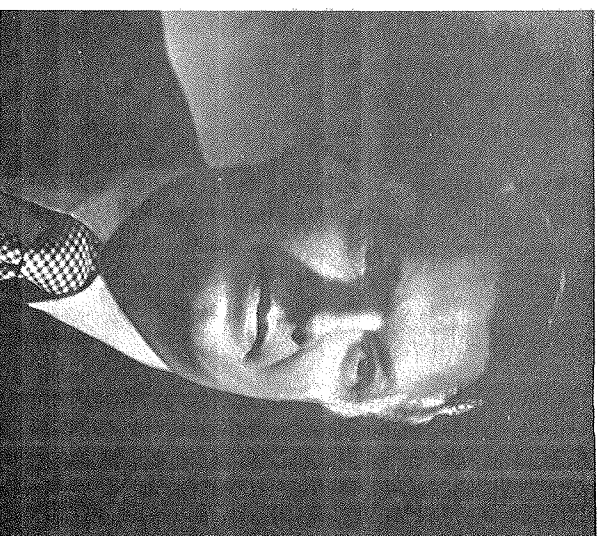

A.B. (Pete) Slaybaugh has been associated with Conoco Inc. since 1950 and has been a vice president of the company since 1968. Currently, he makes his headquarters in Denver and is the company's chief representative in the western states.

A native of Oklahoma and a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, he joined Conoco as a petroleum engineer in the production department at Houston. After serving in a number of assignments at field locations in Texas and New Mexico, he became assistant division production superintendent at Roswell, New Mexico, and then district production manager at Hobbs, New Mexico.

In 1964, he returned to Houston to become director of industrial and personnel relations. He was promoted to general manager of personnel in 1966 and transferred to the company's corporate headquarters which was then located in New York City.

He was elected a vice-president of the company in 1968 and continued to serve as general manager of personnel. On May 1, 1974, he transferred to Denver to serve as vice-president for what was then the company's Western Hemisphere petroleum Division.

Slaybaugh is a member of the Denver Chamber of Commerce Board, a director of the Colorado Association of Commerce and Industry, President of the Colorado Safety Association, a member of the Society of Petroleum Engineers, a director of the First National Bancorporation, Inc. (Denver-based), and serves on the engineering advisory board of the University of Idaho. He and his wife, Erla, have two children, a daughter and a son.
