

COLLEGE OF INTERNATIONAL STUDIES ACADEMIC ADVISING RESOURCES:

- ❑ **My Schedule:** To view your schedule and to make changes, log into your ONE account. You can see your courses on the home page or in the *Academics* tab. On the *Registration* screen, you can search and register for classes and review your class schedule. Your class schedule will be displayed in colored time blocks. Each course pops up with not only the scheduled weekly meeting times but also the final exam day and time. To understand which are the weekly meeting times and which is the final, select the *Schedule Details* tab.
- ❑ **Working the Waitlist:** If you would like to enroll in a course but it is full, add yourself to a waitlist. Once a seat in the course opens up, you will receive an email informing you that you can now enroll in the course. You will have 24 hours to add the course before you are dropped off the waitlist. Go to *Register for Classes* in ONE. Click *Add* next to the closed class, and it will place the course in your *Summary* view as pending. (A course that is pending is shaded in the summary view.) Change the status from "Self-Service Enrollment" to "Waitlist" and then submit your request.
- ❑ **Foreign Language Assessment/Placement:** Students who have studied a language previously and wish to enroll in a class at OU must take a placement test. This test establishes the student's reading and writing competency level in the language. It also ensures that the student is placed in the most appropriate course for their skill level. - ❑ **Check sheets:** checksheets.ou.edu will give you a complete list of every major and minor at OU broken down by college. You can print these off and see what courses you would need for any degree. Many students use these to research majors, possible double majors, or if they are thinking about switching their major and/or add a minor.
- ❑ **Pre-Law Advising:** OU has a full-time advisor dedicated to students who wish to attend law school. She can offer information on course selections, assistance with law school prep, share events of interest, and information on the undergraduate mock trial team. - ❑ **Center for Major Exploration:** Coaches work one-on-one with students to identify the student's personality type, interest, and aptitudes. Information gained from conversations and assessment tests help identify which majors are a good fit for you.  - CLEP (College-Level Examination Program): Offers students the opportunity to earn college credit for what they already know by taking one of several subject exams. Taking and passing these exams can enable test examinees to gain college credit that can be applied to meet their degree requirements.
 - Prior Learning Assessments developed by academic departments. Upon satisfactory completion, you are awarded credit for the course.
 - Foreign Language Requirement Assessment (FLRA): Waives the general language requirement for students who are already competent in oral, reading, and written skills in another language at or above the intermediate level. It does NOT provide academic credit. *** Foreign Language Requirement Assessments are only offered for languages that are taught at the University of Oklahoma.
