The book covers all **176 species** of odonates documented in Oklahoma (yes, Bill Carrell got one more species on the list, just in the nick of time! - the Red-tailed Pennant, *Brachymesia furcata*; see photo below).

The book appeals to varied interests, and no matter your odonate proficiency, you'll take much from its perusal. For you history buffs, there are chapters delving into the general and environmental history of the state and region. And for those with a paleontological bent, we were fortunate to have a special chapter by Roy J. Beckemeyer detailing the rich paleo-entomological history of the region. Plant lovers and geologists won't be left out either given the chapter on Oklahoma's diverse


landscapes. With all of the context provided and the detailed species discussions, you will discover how inextricably linked Oklahoma odonates are to the rest of North America.
