The Center houses one of the largest congressional archives in the country, with the papers of 61 former members of Congress, and 25 other collections with close ties to congressional politics such as former legislative and political aides, journalists, scholars and organizations. The archive also houses the Kanter Political Commercial archive, one of the major sources for political commercials in the world.

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The Carl Albert Graduate Fellowship is a highly competitive and prestigious program at the Carl Albert Congressional Research and Studies Center at the University of Oklahoma.

Carl Albert Fellows work closely with Center faculty, in cooperation with the Department of Political Science, to pursue an individualized program of study leading to a Ph.D. Fellows focus their program of study on fundamental issues in representative government in America, including the study of institutions, political parties and public policy. Faculty regularly interact with Fellows in a space that facilitates collaboration and scholarly exchange. The laboratory model of graduate education means students will be involved with research from day one. In 2022, Center faculty and students participated in the Cooperative Election Study, a large national survey that includes teams of researchers at a number of universities.

The robust fellowship package provides up to four years (including summers) of financial support as a teaching or research assistant and a final fifth year with no work obligations to complete the dissertation. The fellowship pays for full tuition and fees, funded research and conference travel, health care, course work at the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research and dissertation research funds. The Center also assists Fellows in finding the best possible placement

Peter McLaughlin is a fifth-year Fellow at the Carl Albert Center. His research focuses on the United States Congress in two broad areas: I) the allocation of public resources by the U.S. Congress, and 2) reforms to turn the U.S. Congress into a more representative institution. Peter is the Center's most recent winner of the Nancy L. Mergler Dissertation Completion Fellowship.

McLaughlin's research has been published, or is forthcoming, in the Journal of Public Policy, Political Behavior, Legislative Studies Quarterly, and Politics, Groups, and Identities. Additionally, his research is funded by the APSA Doctoral Dissertation Research Improvement Grant (DDRIG) Program, the Carrie Chapman Catt Center for Women and Politics, and OU's Dodge Family Research Fellowship.
