INTRODUCTION

Established by the Dodge Family College of Ars and Sciences Board of Visitors in 1996, the Leadership Scholars program recognizes the brightest and most involved students in the college.

Leadership Scholars brings students together from a variety of backgrounds, academic disciplines, and experiences to expand their leadership education. The program is based on three pillars: leadership, service, and community. During bi-monthly meetings, students learn about important aspects of leadership from other leaders on campus and from each other. By learning and serving together, Leadership Scholars gain a stronger sense of their own leadership values and are better prepared to demonstrate leadership in the college and across campus.

In 2014, Cathryn and Jon Withrow endowed the Leadership Scholars program with a magnanimous gift of one million dollars. The purpose of their endowment was to fund study abroad scholarships for 20 Leadership Scholars per year. Since their contribution, over 150 Withrow Leadership Scholars have had the honor of studying abroad in France. They return from this experience to serve the college and then the world as they graduate from the university.

In honor of the service of these outstanding young people and with profound gratitude to Cathryn and Jon Withrow for their transformational endowment, the Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences awards the 2024 Distinguished Service Award to the Withrow Leadership Scholars and the Withrows on this 10th anniversary of their gift.

In 2014 under the leadership of Dean Kelly Damphousse, Cathryn and Jon Withrow endowed the college's Leadership Scholars program. The following year, we began planning the cornerstone of the program: a study abroad opportunity. Both Karen Elmore in our college and Christophe Aurine at Université Blaise Paschal (now Université Clermont Auvergne) in Clermont-Ferrand, France helped me to craft a two-week course that would allow our students to experience three different cities and regions in that beautiful country. In May of 2016, I shared that first course with 13 young people, and my life has never been the same.



Each year, a new cohort of high-achieving and compassionate young people is given the opportunity of a lifetime: to meet themselves and the rest of the world as they experience the culture of France.

LEADERSHIP IN FRANCE

STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM

The cornerstone of the Withrow Leadership Scholars is an annual study abroad program to Clermont-Ferrand, France, a sister city of Norman, Oklahoma. During their time abroad, students are enrolled in a course entitled "Leadership and Service Abroad: Virtues in Community." The premise of this course is that service learning in a geographic location outside their comfort zone is a meaningful method for enhancing student leadership.

During this 2-week course, students participate in a significant study abroad experience that will enhance their leadership ability and engagement when they return to the University of Oklahoma and Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences communities. The study abroad excursions are augmented with readings and writing focused on the development of servant leaders who will return to the OU community and the college and invest in the development of our community.

I was a part of the inaugural trip in the summer of 2016.

My time in France had a profound impact on my young-adult life. I originally left the States in 2016, on my first international flight, thinking I would spend the next few weeks having a great little vacation. I anticipated having a good time with friends, enjoying copious amounts of delicious food, and soaking up all of the art and culture I could. After three short weeks in Clermont, I realized that I had indeed done all of

those things; but perhaps most importantly I had done something even more important- I had fallen in love.

I not only developed a deep love for the country of France- from its people to its food to its urbanism- but also for myself. I feel as if I returned a different person in 2016, as compared to who I was when I departed. The trip helped grow my self-confidence immensely and helped me shed the last of my hesitancy around "putting myself out there." In fact, had I not gone on the original 2016 trip, I may not have seen in myself what others saw in me, and may have never applied to be Chair of the wonderful Withrow Leadership Scholars.

There is something quite disarming about traveling abroad on your own, to a place where no one speaks your language, and you know very few people. If you allow it, such experiences can be extremely transformative. As such, I am immensely grateful that the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Withrow afforded me this opportunity to be transformed.

I currently reside in Tulsa with my husband, Joseph, and my two dogs, Roxie and Moose. I work for the City of Owasso as the Planning Manager, within the Community Development Department. My Department oversees both current developments within the City (permits, site plans, planning and zoning, etc.) and long-range projects (comprehensive land use planning, grant writing, community engagement, etc.). I am very happy to call the Tulsa-metro home!

Because of your endowment to the Leadership Scholars program, I was able to go abroad for the first time in my life the summer of 2016 to Clermont. I still fondly think back to that summer with classmates who have now become lifelong friends. I still daydream about the cafe on our way to our class building where we'd stop every morning for espresso and pastries (ordered in our terrible attempts at French). I remember the wonderful conversations we'd have over jambon-beurre sandwiches

in Clermont's many parks with French students about the nature of leadership, service, and our studies. And of course, I cherish all of the spontaneously and serendipitously beautiful moments throughout our trip: taking refuge from the rain in a cathedral in Lyon as mass began after a long stroll through the city, arranging stones to spell "OU" within the Puy de Dome after a day of hiking, and seeing the original Thinker statue after stumbling upon the sculpture garden at the original Rodin museum while exploring Paris.

The France trip with LS certainly changed my life and expanded my worldview tremendously. While an undergraduate, I then also completed a study abroad trip in Rio de Janeiro learning public health and urban planning following the Zika virus outbreak. I also took classes in French in addition to my course work in Spanish Literature after the LS trip, continuing to develop an appreciation for how language, literature, and travel bridge distances between people and culture. This is a common thread that has continued to mark my academic and professional careers, as I led an initiative for promoting health literacy surrounding coronavirus vaccinations among uninsured Spanish-speaking patients in Tulsa, OK while in medical school there. And now, without the travel restrictions of the pandemic, I am currently preparing for an 8-week trip to Kenya in my current role as a resident physician at Duke University Medical Center.

Since moving to North Carolina after completing undergraduate and medical school studies at OU, I've been training as a resident physician in Internal Medicine, with plans to pursue a career in Pulmonary and Critical Care. I've been spending time developing research and clinical interests in critically ill patients with significant social vulnerably as well as pulmonary disease to due environmental and occupational exposures.

My gratitude is boundless, even 8 years later, by your gift which has truly influenced the course of my life.


At some point, while cleaning out my room, I found my old journal that I had used during the Leadership Scholars France trip. As I was reading through the various reflections on conversations I'd had with others on that trip, I noticed a recurring theme that we'd discussed on the importance of service in our local communities. Those recollections had a major impact on reshaping my perspective and motivated me to shift my focus to things on which I could have a more direct impact. It ultimately led to my decision to apply to the Minneapolis Redistricting Group, an independent body tasked with redrawing the city's electoral boundaries. Instead of feeling demotivated about reports of gerrymandering at the federal level, I could concentrate my attention on fighting it at the local level. In addition to being a rewarding experience, it also introduced me to people in city government who encouraged me to apply to other bodies and resulted in my appointment by the mayor and city council to a housing policy working group, where I had the opportunity to make use of the bachelor's in economics I had received from OU.

I no longer live in Minneapolis but my passion for serving local government has not left me. After recently completing my PhD in biostatistics, I moved to Morristown, New Jersey for a job with Novartis. Within a month of moving to Morristown I emailed the mayor and said "I'm new to town and eager to serve, where's the need?" and was appointed to the town's Environmental Commission. I don't know how long I'll stay in Morristown but no matter where I live I'll always be looking for local opportunities to serve, especially the obscure bodies that tend to be overlooked or dismissed as "boring".



I visited France in the summer of 2018. That trip was an incredible opportunity to strengthen my friendships with people in my cohort at the Withrow Leadership Scholars Program and to learn more about French cultural and social life. Visiting Paris, Lyon, and Claremont-Ferrand was humbling and transformative. I gained real-life, firsthand experience with French social life, practiced the limited French I knew then, and visited historical places I had learned about in my history classes,

books, and even children's cartoons I used to watch growing up in Angola. These landmarks included the Louvre, the Puy de Dôme, and the Roman ruins in and around that region of France, such as the Gergovie plateau. Exploring these sites taught me a great deal about the diversity and richness of French history and community life.

One of the most impressive aspects of the trip was discovering the large number of underground tunnels, corridors, hiding places, and old houses. Nearly every old building we entered had underground locations connecting it to others or different parts of the city. Our guide informed us that many of those infrastructures were built during the Crusades, medieval military expeditions by European Catholics aimed at reclaiming the Holy Land from Muslims. These underground spaces also served as hiding places for people and soldiers during enemy attacks. Learning about these historical events was fascinating for me. As someone who values and studies History and Sociology, witnessing these old infrastructures and hearing their histories made me feel like I was experiencing life in historical France, making my trip uniquely valuable and authentic.

For all these experiences and great memories of my life, I would like to express my gratitude to the Withrow family for supporting the Withrow Leadership Scholars Program, especially the trip to France.

I am currently pursuing a Ph.D. in Political Science and MS in Management Information Technology at the University of Oklahoma. Additionally, I work as a Graduate Teaching Assistant for the course of American Federal Government.

I went to France with my cohort in May 2019 - the month of my OU graduation. To this day, I still think of that trip fondly. Sometimes, it's the intangibles that shape your life more profoundly. Beyond the obvious aspects of simply traveling to an entirely new country (my first time to France, and my first time actually traveling across an entire ocean), traveling with the cohort really made the trip significantly more memorable. The latenight adventures searching for food in a city that became quiet when the sun set, the laughs we shared between

moments of undeniable absurdity, the thoughtful and incredulous moments of reflection when we realized, "This sure isn't America" - these moments became more treasured when I shared them with others. I do believe that it was the years following my trip to France that imparted more clarity. Although my cohort often said in jest that "This sure isn't America" while we were in France, I think it was important to have gained that perspective. We seek knowledge wherever we go - we hope to use our experience and knowledge to better our lives and the lives of those around us. Yet if we are blind, or if we lack the insight to know what is wrong or inadequate, then we often fail ourselves.
