## **DR. JUNE ABBAS**

Hello everyone. I am currently a Professor and Acting Director of SLIS. I have been at OU for almost 15 years (wow! has it been that long already?). Prior to coming to OU, I began my academic career at the University of New York in Buffalo, NY. After attaining tenure and promotion at UB, we opted to move out of the cold winters and come to Oklahoma and the hot summers. We have lived in several US states, such as South Dakota, Texas (twice), New Mexico, Kansas, New York, and now Oklahoma. We plan to retire here or in Utah (see below why).

I am blessed to be the lifelong partner and wife of Charles (40 years this summer) and mother to two young men, Clifford and Ben. Every day is a new adventure that I am happy to share with them. I graduated from UNT in 2001 with my PhD in Information Science, from Emporia State University in 1998 with my MLS, and worked in various public and special libraries for over 10 years. I fondly remember when we first had access to the Internet in the Sioux Falls, S.D. Public Library when I was a library assistant while attending undergraduate school.

My research connects the three pillars of our field, information and knowledge organization, information behavior, and information retrieval within human centered design. I am currently involved in a research group at OU called the OU Humanitarian Innovation Research Group (OU HIRG). which includes an interdisciplinary group of researchers from OU's various colleges and departments, such as Social Work, Architecture, Business, Education and Math, and the Innovation Hub. Noyori-Corbett and Ruan in which we are investigating traumainformed public library services for refugees in US public libraries.

I teach a range of courses related to the organization of information and knowledge including Information Organization, Digital Collections, Online Information Retrieval, Data Stewardship, among others. I am also teaching a special topics doctoral level course Theories of Knowledge Organization and the Doctoral Seminars for research and scholarly writing.

When I have time, I love to read mysteries of all kinds, to sew (making two little girl dresses right now), to knit, and to watch movies with my sons. In the summer I am often out fishing with my youngest son or walking with our two German Shorthaired Pointers.

I am not a cook. My husband, however, is a wonderful cook and he loves to experiment in the kitchen. I am also gluten-free and lactose intolerant so my diet and feeding me can be challenging, but he has developed the best gluten-free bread I have yet found! When we do eat out, I love Indian food of all regions. I especially love dosas.

Our favorite vacation spot is in Utah near Moab and Green River. We spent hours jeeping through the valleys and riverbeds, digging for various kinds of rocks and dinosaur bones. We also love petroglyph spotting through the canyons near Moab and on the way to Salt Lake City. #### Sharing Our Stories to Support Health & Wellness in Rural Communities



Faculty members Ellen Rubenstein and Susan Burke, in conjunction with partners Christine D'Arpa at Wayne State University and Noah Lenstra at University of North Carolina at Greensboro, recently presented two interactive online events about their IMLS arant (#LG-18-19-0015), Community Health and Wellness: Small and Rural Library Practices, Perspectives, and Programs. The grant research, which began July 2019 and ends June 2023, asked the overarching question, "How do small and rural public libraries address health and wellness through their programs and services?" and consisted of looking at small and rural public libraries in four states: Michigan, North Carolina, Oklahoma, and Vermont and how they interacted with their communities to help them access health and wellness programming and information. The first event, on March 23, Sharing Our Stories to Support Health & Wellness in Rural Communities, focused on how libraries can form partnerships with members of the community to develop and present programs, and invited participants, primarily librarians and LIS students, to share their experiences on their own partnerships and programs. The second event, on April 11, Community Health and Wellness in Small and Rural Libraries: Advancing LIS Research and Education, was directed at LIS researchers and students and presented findings from the grant including ideas on successful partnerships with students on grant research and implications for LIS education. Dr. Jigun Liu's new research book, A Behavioral Economics Approach to Interactive Information retrieval: Understanding and Supporting Boundedly Rational Users, was featured in OU's Data Institute For Societal Challenges (DISC) newsletter (January 12, 2022). This book (published by Springer) is part of his National Science Foundation project and "brings together insights from information seeking and retrieval, cognitive psychology and behavioral economics, and shows how this new interdisciplinary approach can advance knowledge about users interacting with diverse search systems, especially their seemingly irrational decisions and anomalies that could not be predicted by most normative computational models." Dr. Lu has been made a co-PI of a recently awarded ICAST/DISC grant, entitled "Leveraging Big Data to Improve Quality in Infants' and Toddlers' Language Learning Environments." The research team will use AI techniques to understand how children acquire language skills. His role is to use Natural Language Processing techniques to understand the complexity and lexicon of children's language. The team is comprised of interdisciplinary researchers from education, linguistics, computer science and SLIS.

## VIRTUAL STUDENT INTERNSHIP PLACEMENT FAIR

Virtual Student Internship Placement Fair On April 25th, OU SLIS hosted a very successful internship placement fair with more than ten representatives from sites interested in having OU SLIS interns. The event was open to both undergraduate and graduate students with more than fifteen students attending. Ryan Linehan, BSIST Student

Ryan Linehan, a senior pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Information Science & Technology (BSIST) degree, has accepted a position as "Deployment Engineer" with Paycom. As a Deployment Engineer, Linehan's responsibilities include collaborating with Quality Assurance, Development, and IT teams in the deployment, testing and debugging of the enterprise application systems, deploying new application software and updates to web applications, web services, windows services, and scheduled tasks. He will be providing level 1 support for software releases and enterprise systems, testing and level 1 production environments, including issues related to source code repositories, debugging application issues to identify problems, and level 1 production environments by reviewing errors and program code. Linehan shared that earning the BSIST degree gave him an edge for the job in several ways, the degree itself met the job's education requirement and the coursework helped Ryan develop skills that made him a good candidate for the position. For example, during his internship, Ryan gained authentic and extensive working knowledge of the Microsoft Desktop Operating System by providing technical support to coworkers. The Database Design and Information Organization course provided skills in SQL and coding in that environment, where he learned about relational databases and server and client server concepts. Ryan's capstone project provided hands-on experience with MySQL when his team created a website attached to a MySQL database, and the Cybersecurity course furthered skills and knowledge related to the TCP/IP protocol, along with TCP and UDP ports. Linehan shared, "the position required accomplished troubleshooting skills, and if being in IT has taught me anything, it is that the solution will not just appear, so it is important to learn how to troubleshoot and solve your own problems. Just looking up an answer for a solution won't do the trick, so you need to step back and think about how you got into this situation. Take a couple steps back and try to think about a solution for the big picture; what you truly want, then go from there and accomplish the small steps until you believe you have enough information or knowledge to complete the "original" task at-hand." Congratulations, Ryan!
