

# About the Program.



Each semester, the Honors College sponsors the Informal Reading Program. The groups, composed of 10 to 15 participants and a moderator from the Honors College faculty, staff or student body, meet once a week to discuss their chosen book. The books cover a wide range of topics, and most have been reccomended by Honors College students. This is a great chance to meet and connect with other students that share similar interests. The groups are open to all OU students, not just Honors College members.

To participate, the only commitment is that each student make a good-faith effort to do the reading and come to the group meeting as often as possible. The goal of the program is to offer participants "maximun information and enjoyment, without stress which is why the program features no quizzes, no fees, and no grades. All books will be provided free of charge.

Talking to Strangers: What We Should Know About the People We Don't Know







# **Silent Spring**

Moderated by: Marli Brazell and Michaella Reed Mondays at 3:00 pm in DLB RM 182, for 7 weeks


Rachel Carson's "Silent Spring" published in 1962, is a nonfiction book that influenced the national debate surrounding the impact of human behavior on the environment. Carson's analysis sheds light on the unintended adverse effects of the commercial use of DDT (an insecticide) on human behavior on the environment. Carson encourages the responsible handling of synthetic chemicals to avoid further disruptions to the ecosystem. Following its release, "Silent Spring" faced intense condemnation from critics associated with chemical companies, who dismissed Carson's writing as too radical. Carson's assertations remain relevant as environmental degradation persists. This discussion might interest you if you enjoy reading about environmental science, the military-industrial complex, the Cold War era, nuclear fallout, and American history post-World War II.

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## Neuromancer

Neuromancer is a multiple award-winning significant piece of science fiction. It quite rightly predicted many of the situations that come from social media, in a highly technological environment of online existence. Understanding this is fundamental to grasping the changes that we experience in a data-grounded and digital media environments.


# **Pride and Prejudice**






# Of Bears and Ballots Moderated by: Abby Bitterman Tuesdays 4:30 in DLB RM 182, for 8 weeks

# Moderated by: Imelda Aldava Tuesdays at 5:00 pm Cate 1 RM 214, for 5 weeks




# The Hunger Games Moderated by Kamri Williams Wednesdays at 1:30 pm DLB RM 182, for 8 weeks







# **Vicious**






# Thursday Groups


## Dracula

this iconic literary work.




# Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man Moderated by: Evan Jones Fridays at 1:00 pm, DLB RM 182, for 8 weeks


