NORMAN CAMPUS

The central campus and the offices of administration of the University of Oklahoma are located on some 3,500 acres in Norman, a city of 100,000 residents. Norman is located near the center of the state, 20 miles south of Oklahoma City, the state capital.

The colleges housed on the Norman campus are University College, the College of Architecture, the College of Arts and Sciences, the Michael F. Price College of Business, the College of Education, the College of Engineering, the Weitzenhoffer Family College of Fine Arts, the College of Geosciences, the Graduate College, the Honors College, the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication, the College of Law, and the College of Liberal Studies. The Norman campus is also headquarters for the College of Continuing Education, which directs outreach programs throughout the state and around the world.

The Norman campus consists of three sections -- central campus, south campus and north campus. Most of the academic and administrative buildings are located on the central campus, noted for its Cherokee Gothic architecture and award-winning landscaping. Also situated on the central campus are the university residence halls; the Sarkeys Energy Center; the University Libraries; the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art; Catlett Music Center, including Sharp Concert Hall and Pitman Recital Hall; Oklahoma Memorial Union; recreational facilities, including the Huston Huffman Physical Fitness Center and the Murray Case Sells Swim Complex; the Gaylord Family Oklahoma Memorial Stadium; and the Oklahoma Center for Continuing Education, a year-round educational center and conference site. Located one block east of the central campus is the OU Brandt Park and the Duck Pond, a recreational area used throughout the year by OU students and Norman residents. David A. Burr Park is conveniently located near residence halls and other recreational facilities.

Immediately adjacent to central campus is the south campus, site of the Law Center and OU Foundation; the Stephenson Research and Technology Center; the University apartments; Lloyd Noble Center and parking complex; the tennis complex; the Jimmie Austin University of Oklahoma Golf Course; L. Dale Mitchell Baseball Park; the Women's Softball facility; the Sam Viersen Gymnastics Center; and OUr Children's World Learning Center. The world-class Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History opened to the public in 2000.

North campus, which is two miles north of the central campus, includes the Merrick Computer Center; Max Westheimer Airport, the University-operated airport that also serves the city of Norman; Swearingen Research Park, where government agencies and industry have established facilities; and a complex of federal, state, private, and university meteorological agencies including the National Severe Storms Laboratory, the National Weather Service Forecast Office, the Storm Prediction Center, and the NEXRAD Operational Test Facility.

Other research and study units of the university include the Biological Station on Lake Texoma; the Sutton Avian Research Center in Bartlesville; the Oklahoma Geophysical Observatory at Leonard near Tulsa; the Aquatic Biology Fisheries Research Center in Noble near Norman; and the Oklahoma Climatological Survey, the Oklahoma Biological Survey, the Oklahoma Archaeological Survey, the Charles M. Russell Center for the Study of Art of the American West, the Cooperative Institute for Mesoscale Meteorological Studies (CIMMS), and the Center for the Analysis and Prediction of Storms (CAPS) in Norman. In addition, the Oklahoma Geological Survey is a separate state agency located on the Norman campus and responsible to the University of Oklahoma Regents.

HEALTH SCIENCES CENTER

The University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center is the state's major educational resource for training physicians, dentists, nurses, pharmacists, public health specialists and a wide range of allied health personnel.

The center is composed of the College of Allied Health, College of Dentistry, College of Medicine, College of Nursing, College of Pharmacy, the College of Public Health and the Graduate College.

Faculty and students use the clinical, laboratory and teaching facilities at the OU Medical Center, Veterans Administration Medical Center, Children's Hospital at OU Medical Center, Presbyterian Hospital, Dean A. McGee Eye Institute, Oklahoma State Department of Health, Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation, other affiliated hospitals in Oklahoma City, the major teaching hospitals in Tulsa, the Veterans Administration Hospital in Muskogee and various affiliated hospitals and clinics in other locations in Oklahoma. The OU Health Sciences Center is the educational core of a group of 28 public and private health care institutions that make up the Oklahoma Health Center.

Also housed at the University of Oklahoma is OU Physicians, the state's largest physician group. The practice encompasses nearly every adult and child specialty. Many OU Physicians have expertise in the management of complex conditions. Such expertise is unavailable anywhere else in the state, region or sometimes even the nation. Some have pioneered surgical procedures or innovations in patient care that are world firsts. They also serve as faculty at the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine and train the region's future physicians.

TULSA LOCATIONS

OU-Tulsa is located at the Schusterman Center, 4502 East 41st St., Tulsa, OK 74135. On this campus both the OU Health Sciences Center and the OU Norman Campus offer programs, including graduate degrees in Allied Health, Nursing, Medicine, Doctor of Pharmacy, Public Health, Architecture, Human Relations, Library and Information Studies, Knowledge Management, Organizational Dynamics, Public Administration, Social Work, Music Education (Kodaly Certificate), Education, Telecommunications Systems and a Doctor of Philosophy in Organizational Leadership. Degree completion programs in undergraduate Nursing and a Bachelor of Liberal Studies are also offered in Tulsa.

COLLEGE OF CONTINUING EDUCATION

The College of Continuing Education provides academic outreach opportunities to the state, region and nation. As the administrative unit for outreach at the University of Oklahoma, continuing education programs are the means by which the university extends its resources to the people of Oklahoma and beyond. By encompassing comprehensive, multidisciplinary academic services and programs that focus on the needs of adult learners, the College of Continuing Education offers both credit and noncredit courses, seminars, workshops, conferences, correspondence study, public service activities, and travel/study programs. The diversity and quality of the services available through continuing education programs provide an exciting and challenging academic experience.

- 1890 On December 19, Territorial Governor Steele approved bills for the location of three territorial schools: the university at Norman, the agricultural and mechanical school at Stillwater, and a normal school at Edmond.
- 1891 First Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma appointed by Governor Steele.
- 1892 David Ross Boyd, Superintendent of the Arkansas City, Kansas school system, became first president of the University of Oklahoma.

On September 15, OU enrolled the first students. Of the 57 students who presented themselves for admission, not one qualified for freshman standing. Therefore, the university began its career as a preparatory school and continued as such for several years.

1893 First college freshman enrolled.

School of Pharmacy founded in response to demands for pharmacists in the territory.

First annual catalog published; four departments were advertised: Preparatory, Collegiate, Pharmaceutical, and Musical.

- 1894 Oklahoma Historical Society organized.
- 1896 First degree--that of Pharmaceutical Chemist--conferred.
- 1898 First Bachelor of Arts degree conferred.

University created four new divisions: Graduate work, Premedical work, School of Music, and the Summer School.

First graduate students enrolled.

1899 Alumni Association organized.

Territorial legislature authorized creation of a department of Geology and Natural History, which later became the Geological Survey.

First honorary degree conferred.

1900 First Master of Arts degree conferred.

First medical instruction offered.

- 1901 Major elective system, with prescribed work in English, French, or German, biology or chemistry, and history was adopted by College of Arts and Sciences.
- 1902 School of Fine Arts established from School of Music.
- 1903 First Bachelor of Science degree conferred.

Funds donated by Andrew Carnegie for the construction of a university library.

School of Applied Science with curricula in mechanical, electrical, and civil engineering established.First Rhodes Scholar from OU chosen.

1911 School of Nursing established.

First Doctor of Medicine degrees conferred.

President Evans resigned; Dean Julien Monnet of the Law School became Acting President.

The State Board of Education became governing board of the university.

1912 First law degrees conferred.

State University Hospital opened in Oklahoma City and operated a Training School for Nurses.

Stratton D. Brooks became President of OU.

- 1913 School of Journalism and School of Commerce and Industry organized in College of Arts and Sciences. University Extension Departments organized.
- 1916 The Oklahoma Daily, first daily student newspaper, began operations.
- 1917 Student Loan Aid Association incorporated.
- 1919 School of Home Economics established in College of Arts and Sciences.

The Seventh Legislature repealed provision that made State Board of Education the Board of Regents and set up a new and separate Board of Regents for OU.

1991 Eight new endowed professorships and chairs created.

OU was selected as the site for the new Storm Prediction Center by the National Weather Service to provide short-term hazardous weather guidance for the continental U.S.

1996 Honors College established.

OU Health Sciences Center's Oklahoma Telemedicine Network, a major medical communications system, was dedicated.

International Programs Center established. Edward J. Perkins, former U.S. ambassador to Australia. became the center's first director.

The OU Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art acquired the Fleishchaker Art Collection, which includes more than 400 major works by notable artists.

1996 OU initiated the Faculty-in-Residence Program, in which faculty members live in student residence halls to create a sense of family and community on campus.

The Presidential Professors program was established to reward both senior and junior faculty who excel in teaching and research.

A new program, "OU Cousins," was established to help form friendships between volunteer American students and international students.

1997 An \$18 million endowment to OU's College of Business by alumnus Michael F. Price was the largest gift to a public university and the third largest gift to higher education in the U.S. that year. In honor of his contributions, the college was named after Price.

The International Programs Center served as host for the first Foreign Policy Conference.

1998 A \$5 million gift by alumnus and Broadway producer A. Max Weitzenhoffer and his family benefited the Musical Theatre Program, which OU Regents named in his honor.

The Great Reading Room in Bizzell Memorial Library was named in honor of Peggy V. Helmerich.

The Morris R. Pitman family made a \$700,000 gift to endow the gardens of OU's south oval.

The 105,000-square-foot, four-story Stanton L. Young Biomedical Research Center opened at the OU Health Sciences Center.

The first University Vice President for Technology Development named and the Office of Technology Transfer was created.

Department of Dance became the School of Dance.

1999 OU/OSU Research and Graduate Education Center in Tulsa was officially opened.

Ken Lackey was named OU-Tulsa's first president.

The Charles M. Russell Center for the Study of Art of the American West was dedicated.

The Prentice Gautt Academic Center, located in Oklahoma Memorial Stadium, was dedicated.

The Health Sciences Center and Norman campus of OU teamed up with the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation to form a new Bioengineering Center.

The Donald W. Reynolds Foundation made an \$11.2 million gift for geriatric research and education at the OU Health Sciences Center.

The Schusterman Family Foundation of Tulsa made a grant to establish a new campus for the OU Health Sciences Center-Tulsa, which was named the Schusterman Health Sciences Center at OU-Tulsa.

2000 The Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History opened to the public. The 195,000-square-foot museum, featuring thousands of artifacts selected from millions in its collections, is the largest natural history museum in the world associated with a university.

The School of Petroleum and Geological Engineering was renamed in honor of Curtis W. Mewbourne.

2000 The School of Journalism and Mass Communication was elevated to college status. The college was named in honor of the Edward L. Gaylord publishing family of Oklahoma City, who made a \$22 million gift to the college.

Through a bequest by the late Clara Weitzenhoffer, OU received the most important gift of French Impressionist art ever made to a public university and the largest gift to a public university in Oklahoma history. The Clara and Aaron Weitzenhoffer Collection comprises 33 works of art by such artists as Degas, Gauguin, Monet, Pissarro, Renoir, Toulouse-Latrec, Van Gogh and Vuillard.

OU's five-year Reach for Excellence Campaign concluded after raising \$514 million in private gifts, more than double the original goal of \$200 million and ranking OU's as the fourth most successful campaign among those completed by U.S. public universities.

First OU academic occupant, College of Pharmacy, moved into the Schusterman Center in Tulsa.

2001 The School of International and Area Studies was created.

The A. Max Weitzenhoffer Department of Musical Theatre was awarded department status.

The Health Sciences Center established a general clinical research center to provide treatment in an environment that assures maximum patient safety and enhancement of Oklahoma's biomedical research infrastructure to enable scientists from across the state to use the human genome data as well as new imaging technologies to study human diseases.

A state-of-the-art practice facility for OU Physicians, the OU Physicians Building, was completed.

Post-tenure review process was approved.

The Schusterman Center, headquarters for OU-Tulsa area programs, was formally dedicated.

Ken Levit named OU-Tulsa's second president.

2002 All OU programs in Tulsa moved to the Schusterman Center in the fall. This marked the first time in the university's history that all Tulsa academic programs were under one roof.

Edward L. Gaylord, on behalf of the Gaylord family of Oklahoma City, presented a \$12 million gift to OU to complete the \$75 million expansion and restoration of Oklahoma Memorial Stadium. In recognition the stadium was named the Gaylord Family Oklahoma Memorial Stadium.

To promote reading and improve academic achievement, OU's Athletics Department and University Libraries formed a partnership to establish a \$1 million endowment by making a leadership gift of \$250,000 toward the endowment, using royalties derived from the sale of athletics merchandise.

The Henderson-Tolson Cultural Center, honoring George Henderson and Melvin B. Tolson Jr., two of OU's most outstanding black faculty, was dedicated.

OU held the 75th Anniversary Celebration of the Western History Collections, a collection of materials relating to the history of Oklahoma, the American Southwest, the American westward expansion and the history of American Indians in the American West.

Some 2,000 different Bibles, many notable and rare, and auxiliary and specialized studies about the Bible were given to the OU Libraries, complementing the Libraries' world-renowned William Bizzell Bible Collection of 665 Bibles and related works.

2002 Rare books, antique doctors' bags, medical instruments and microscopes filled the History of Medicine Collection as it opened its doors in its new home in the Robert M. Bird Health Sciences Library.

OU was selected as one of seven public and private research/doctoral institutions to receive the 2002 Circle of Excellence in Educational Fund Raising Award from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education.

2003 Fourteen new endowed faculty positions were created with FY2003 gifts.

President David L. Boren initiated the Sooner Heritage Scholarships Campaign in January 2003 to assist students and their families in absorbing an increase in tuition and fees.

A \$10 million grant from the Schusterman Family Foundation to the Tulsa campus enabled the OU-Tulsa campus to move forward with the construction of a Multipurpose Educational Facility.

Groundbreaking was held for the OU-Tulsa Research and Medical Clinic at the Schusterman Center, made possible by the passage of the Vision 2025 bond issue.

A number of significant construction projects were begun on the Norman campus in 2003, including historic Holmberg Hall's \$18 million renovation, the Stephenson Research and Technology Center, a new addition to the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art, and the second phase of the Nielsen Hall addition and renovation project. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held for Gaylord Hall, future home of the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication, as well as for Michael F. Price Hall, the addition to Adams Hall for the Michael F. Price College of Business.

The Thams Collection of Southwestern art by members of the famous Taos Society of Artists, also known as the Taos Colony, opened to the public at the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art. The collection was one of the most important single gifts of art to a public university in Oklahoma history.

OU continued its chain of record-breaking years in research and funding for externally sponsored programs. The National Science Foundation awarded OU a five-year Information Technology Research Grant to improve the detection and prediction of high impact local weather. OU was named a primary partner in the Engineering Research Center for Collaborative Adaptive Sensing of the Atmosphere. Funded in part by the National Science Foundation, the center's focus will be ground-breaking sensing technology that will improve forecasts and warnings of such weather hazards as tornadoes and flash floods. A \$10 million grant -- the largest ever in the OU College of Dentistry's 33-year history -- will allow researchers to look at new ways of fighting tooth decay and gum disease.

The first student housing facility at the OU Health Sciences Center, University Village Apartments, opened.

The new Dermatology Surgery Center opened at OU Physicians Dermatology in Oklahoma City.

2004 The Board of Regents recognized David L. Boren, President, and Molly Shi Boren, First Lady, for 10 years of leadership with the designation of the Honors College building as David L. Boren Hall, the student center at the Health Sciences Center as the David L. Boren Student Union and a street at Tulsa's Schusterman Center as David L. Boren Blvd. To honor Mrs. Boren, a courtyard and shade garden at the Health Sciences Center was named the Molly Shi Boren Courtyard and the ballroom in Oklahoma Memorial Union was named the Molly Shi Boren Ballroom.

The OU College of Fine Arts was named the Weitzenhoffer Family College of Fine Arts after a family with a long history of supporting the university.

2004 Gaylord Hall, a \$17 million 59,500-square-foot state-of-the-art media education facility, and home to the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication, was dedicated.

A \$1 million grant from the Inasmuch Foundation of Oklahoma City enabled OU to launch the Edith Kinney Gaylord Expository Writing Program, the first program at a public university modeled on Harvard University's Expository Writing Program.

OU's Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art received half of the prestigious R.E. Mansfield collection of Native American art, which includes ceramics, paintings, beadwork, sculpture and textiles, with the balance going to the Smithsonian.

The University celebrated the reopening of a newly remodeled Huston Huffman Physical Fitness Center, voted for and paid for by student funds.

OU celebrated the opening of One Partners Place, an office space designed to foster collaborations with private companies on the Research Campus. The U.S. Operations Center of Weathernews Inc., the world's largest publicly traded, full-service weather facility, is housed in half of the facility.

OU crossed the \$200 million mark in research and funding for externally sponsored programs.






University Development Organizational Chart


Department of Intercollegiate Athletics Organization Chart




University Outreach Organizational Chart




Student Affairs Organizational Chart

Norman Campus Provost Organizational Chart




Norman Campus Administrative Affairs Organizational Chart








Combined ACT/SAT Scores by College

First-Time Student ACT Composite Scores by Discipline



First-Time Students by High School Rank - 2004































Space By Room Use




