## Commemorating 100 years of PBK at OU

On the afternoon of Monday, May 24, 1920, the national Phi Beta Kappa office officially opened a chapter on the Norman campus. The University had been trying to convince the national office that the quality of academic life at the school was worthy of recognition alongside the other eighty-nine American colleges and universities that already had chapters. The wish was granted, and the University was determined to celebrate the occasion suitably. It was "a compliment to any school to be placed in the company of those highest institutions in the country which are allowed to join in this privilege," said the dean of the Law School, Julien C. Monnet. It was Monnet who led the long effort to gain the recognition and would serve as the chapter's first president.

Seventeen members of the University's faculty, who had been elected to Phi Beta Kappa at other institutions, together with eighty-one alumni of the University--four or five top graduates selected from each of the classes between 1902 and 1919--were chosen to inaugurate the chapter. Those who could, gathered in the office of President Stratton Brooks at 4:00 PM on the grand day. They were met there by Francis Shepardson, vice president of the national society, who came from Illinois to preside over the festivities. He presented the new chapter, informally, with its charter, and supervised the initiation of its members. This was followed by an elaborate banquet at the TeePee House on University Boulevard, complete with speeches and music. At 8:00 PM they all marched down to the University Auditorium (Holmberg Hall) where Shepardson presented the charter formally, gave a keynote address and heard grateful responses from students, faculty, and President Brooks.

Dr. Heather Shotton is Educational Leadership and Policy Studies department chair, Director of Indigenous Education Initiatives and associate professor at the University of Oklahoma.

Dr. Shotton is a citizen of the Wichita & Affiliated Tribes, and is also of Kiowa and Cheyenne descent and has previously served as an associate professor in Native American Studies at OU. She received her doctorate in Adult and Higher Education from the University of Oklahoma in 2008. Her research focuses on Indigenous students in higher education and Indigenous women, particularly in the areas of leadership and Indigenous women in academia. She served as a co-editor for the book, *Beyond the Asterisk*: Understanding Native Students in Higher Education (Stylus), which addresses strategies for serving Native college students, and is a co-editor for the forthcoming book, Reclaiming Indigenous Research in Higher Education (Rutgers University Press). Prior to returning to OU she served as assistant director of multicultural student affairs at Oklahoma City University. She has spent her career serving students both in and out of the classroom. Dr. Shotton is the past president for the National Indian Education Association and was recently named the NIEA Educator of the Year. She is a strong advocate for Native education and serves Native students and communities on a national and local level.

Heather Shotton was recently named the recipient of the CEP Mildred García Award for Exemplary Scholarship (Senior Scholar) by the Association for the Study of Higher Education. ASHE awards recognize exemplary achievements and contributions to the study of higher education through research, leadership, or service to ASHE and the field of higher education. The purpose of the García Award for Exemplary Scholarship is to recognize scholars for seminal, exemplary scholarship that focuses on research and issues specifically related to underrepresented populations of color.

## Phi Beta Kappa CEO Dr. Fred Lawrence Visits OU

On November 12, 2019 Phi Beta Kappa members and University community were invited to participate in a visit to University of Oklahoma by Fred Lawrence, the National CEO and Secretary of Phi Beta Kappa. Prior to assuming the leadership of PBK, he was President of Brandeis University, Dean of the George Washington University School, and is a Distinguished Lecturer at the Georgetown Law Center.

An accomplished scholar, teacher and attorney, Lawrence is one of the nation's leading experts on civil rights, free expression and bias. Lawrence has published widely and lectured internationally. He is the author of Punishing Hate: Bias Crimes Under American Law (Harvard University Press 1999), examining bias-motivated violence and the laws governing how such violence is punished in

the United States.

The Alpha of Oklahoma PBK chapter hosted a reception (5:00-5:30) and a buffet dinner and discussion (5:30-7:00) at the Sneed Lounge on the main level of the College of Law at OU (300 Timberdell Road, Norman). During dinner, Fred Lawrence presented remarks on the topics of free expression and bias.

From 7:00-8:30 pm, a panel discussion was held in the Bell Courtroom on the Main Level of the College of Law on the topic of Free Expression on Campus, exploring the tensions around free speech on campus.
