#### From the President

It's been another successful year for the Alpha of Oklahoma chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. We enjoyed excellent intellectual discussions at two of our chapter's annual events: the Visiting Scholar lecture and our Founders' Day celebration. In November, Religious Studies hosted Visiting Scholar David Haberman. He presented a public lecture at the Sam Noble Museum of Natural History, titled "A Little of that Human Touch: Why Anthropomorphize?" This was followed in December by Rilla Askew's lecture at the Founders' Day event: "Through the Lens of History: Bearing Witness in a Fractured World." Dr. Askew hails from southeastern Oklahoma and is an author of non-fiction and fiction books, short fiction, and essays. This spring we invited 238 wellrounded, outstanding students to join our society, as well as extended an honorary membership to OU's Dr. Lupe Davidson. Dr. Davidson is the Chair of the Department of Women's and Gender Studies and co-Director of the Women's and Gender Studies Center for Social Justice, as well as one of the inaugural Faculty Fellows for Dunham Residential College. She spearheaded the development and implementation of the Diversity Ally Program. As America's most prestigious academic honor society, PBK is uniquely equipped to advocate for the value and benefits of liberal arts and sciences education. The elected members of this chapter do this because we believe the curiosity and creativity cultivated by a liberal arts and sciences education are essential to making the most of life's experiences, and that knowledge and learning frees us from the shackles of prejudice and ignorance.

We live in an increasingly complex world in which not only are science and technology rapidly changing, but also our perceptions of the world, societies and relationships. We need more than ever education that sparks the curiosity and creativity needed to meet an evolving world. One of our largest challenges is recognizing the differences between real, mostly real and fake. To aid our understanding we need to develop and use descriptive language or imagery to describe events as they truly are. Often the right word captures thoughts in ways not possible with even a plethora of lessor words.

The right word or image really matters. For our Founders' Day Lecture, we had an accomplished author who has made a career of expressing ideas and thoughts with the right words and images. Rilla Askew is a native of southeastern Oklahoma and has translated her experiences into written words that really inform how we can view complexities in our world with true understanding. Recently she joined the faculty at the University of Oklahoma in the English Department where she works with students and continues to write.

In the lecture she explored how Oklahoma's complex past and complicated present are extreme manifestations of the American Narrative in her talk, "Through the Lens of History: Bearing Witness in a Fractured World." There also was discussion of the chapter's OU Foundation account for the Roland Lehr fund. The fund was created by the chapter some years ago to award a cash prize to top Phi Beta Kappa graduates who will pursue graduate work in the natural sciences, the physical sciences, or in medicine. The chapter would like to build

up the principal in the fund so that at least one annual award of \$1,000 can be offered. Until that time, the general fund will supplement the prize to ensure \$1,000 is available for awarding. Going forward, any savings from the initiation ceremony this year as compared to last will go toward the fund's principal balance. # Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar

Dr. David Haberman, Professor of Religious Studies, Indiana University, visited the University of Oklahoma (OU) as a PBK Visiting Scholar from Wednesday Nov 8, 2017 through Friday Nov 10, 2017. During his time at OU he presented two guest lectures in undergraduate classes, had a lunch/discussion with undergraduate students, and delivered a well-attended public lecture titled, "A Little of that Human Touch: Why Anthropomorphize?"

Dr. Charles Kimball, Director of the Religious Studies program at OU (which sponsored Dr. Haberman's visit), wrote the following description of the visit:

Each of David's presentations—in two classes, with students during the lunch discussion, and the main university lecture—was very well received. He did a terrific job each and every time. He's a splendid lecturer and a

delightful person. Both Prof. Deonnie Moodie (who teaches Hinduism) and I incorporated David's book, Journey Through the Twelve Forests: An Encounter with Krishna, into our classes last semester. So, having him in class interacting with students during the lunch gathering was particularly meaningful for students.

David had a wonderful experience as well. He said so many times throughout the days he was here in Norman. And, I saw him again a couple of weeks later at the annual meeting of the American Academy of Religion in Boston. A friend brought him to the Harvard University reception where I and four other OU faculty had an opportunity to visit again with him at length. David, who knows the lay of the land in university Humanities programs, was incredibly impressed by what we have built and were doing in the Religious Studies Program at OU. I'm sure he provided very positive feedback to the folks at the national PBK office as well.

David's visit met and exceeded our highest expectations. Thanks again for your help in putting the pieces in place to make this possible. Let's do it again!

In short, Dr. Haberman's visit was greatly enjoyed by the OU community. We very much appreciate Phi Beta Kappa's generosity in making Dr. Haberman available to us as a Visiting Scholar.

Dr. Haberman is the recipient of the Trustees' Teaching Award. He specializes in Hinduism and has spent many years conducting ethnographic and textual research in India. His work, supported by Guggenheim, Fulbright, and ACLS fellowships, is centered on the culture of Braj, an active pilgrimage site in northern India long associated with Krishna.
