TESTING

Here, you will be asked to submit information about your class rank and GPA as well as detailed information about any ACT, SAT, AP, TOEFL, IELTS, and IB scores, if applicable. You may want to pull your score sheets in preparation as you will be asked to provide the dates that you took each test and will take future tests. You will also need to list your highest composite score as well as the highest individual scores you have earned so far, even if those scores are from different test dates. **Remember to also send your scores to us through ACT or The College Board.**

ACTIVITIES

EXTRACURRICULAR, VOLUNTEER & WORK ACTIVITIES You will be asked to list **up to 10** of your main extracurricular activities along with the grade level at which you participated, the time commitment in approximate hours per week and weeks per year, the positions held or honors won, and whether you intend to participate in college. You will also have the opportunity to share **up to 150 characters** of details and accomplishments for each item. You will list these in order of their importance to you, so begin considering what you will list and how you will rank them.

WRITING

There will be a few places on the Common Application where you will be asked to write. These are outlined below.

• You will be asked to write one essay **between 250 and 650 words**. You must stay within that word count. You will be asked to write a response to your choice of one of the five prompts listed below. This essay is designed to demonstrate your ability to write clearly and concisely and help you set your application apart.

1. Some students have a background or story that is so central to their identity that they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.

2. Recount an incident or time when you experienced failure. How did it affect you, and what lessons did you learn?

3. Reflect on a time when you challenged a belief or idea. What prompted you to act? Would you make the same decision again?

4. Describe a place or environment where you are perfectly content. What do you do or experience there, and why is it meaningful to you?

5. Discuss an accomplishment or event, formal or informal, that marked your transition from childhood to adulthood within your culture, community, or family.

- There will be an "Additional Information" section in which you will have an opportunity to include any additional information of
 your choosing. Here, you might include/continue a discussion of something you could not elaborate on before (i.e. resume, list
 additional siblings). We recommend this information stays around 650 words or less. This section should only be used for a
 reason. It's okay to leave this section blank.
- In our supplemental scholarship section, you will be asked to answer the first two questions below. You may also be asked a third major-specific question depending on the academic preferences you list in your Common Application. While this supplement is optional, we recommend you fill it out regardless. **If you do not answer these questions, you will not be considered for OU leadership, community service and major-based scholarships.** Please answer all of these questions in **650 words or less.**

1. The University of Oklahoma believes strongly in educating leaders of communities in Oklahoma, as well as across the country and the world. Please share your leadership experiences and why they are important to you.

2. The University of Oklahoma is home to a vibrant, diverse and compassionate University community. Our President, David L. Boren, refers to our strong community as "the OU Family". Please describe your cultural and community service activities and why you chose to participate in them.

3. What is your career area of interest, and why do you have a desire to work in this particular field? (*This third, academic-based question is asked by certain academic departments. Therefore, it may or may not appear in your scholarship section depending on the academic preferences you list in your application.*)
