### CONGRESSIONAL BILL CB-XXX-XX SENATE BILL GS21-51

#### AS INTRODUCED

An Act of Procedure amending the Code Annotated to include international student liaisons within the Executive Office of the President; providing for short title, providing for codification, and providing for an effective date.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

- Section 1: Title: This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Ensure International Student Voices are Heard Act of 2021."
- **Section 2**: Purpose: The purpose of this act shall be to include international student liaisons to the Executive Office of the President.
- **Section 3**: AMENDATORY: Title III, Chapter 5, Section 24 is amended as follows. For the purposes of this bill, all deletions are marked by a strikethrough and all additions are marked with an <u>underline.</u>

## 24. Departments

The several Departments that shall compose the Cabinet are as follows.

## a. The Department of the Interior

### i. Department Purpose

The Department of the Interior shall advocate for the position of the SGA as it pertains to internal university affairs. SGA policy shall be defined by a Joint or Concurring Resolution passed by the Legislative Branch, or by the SGA President in the absence of such a resolution. The Department shall address on-campus issues including, but not limited to, student parking, student health and wellness, and on-campus sustainability issues.

### ii. Department Director

The Department Director shall be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Legislature. The Director shall be responsible for ensuring that the purpose of the Department of the Interior is carried out.

b. The Department of Inclusivity

### i. Department Purpose

The Department of Inclusivity shall provide assistance, services, and advocacy within the SGA executive branch for underrepresented students on campus. The Department shall address issues that affect international students, students with disabilities, as well as gender and sexual minority issues and multicultural issues. This list is not intended to be restrictive, and more duties may be delegated to the Department at the discretion of the President.

### ii. Department Director

The Department Director shall be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Legislature. The Director shall be responsible for ensuring that the purpose of the Department of Inclusivity is carried out.

### iii. International Student Liaison(s)

The International Student Liaison(s) shall be appointed by the President. The International Student Liaison (s) shall be responsible to voice concerns of International students in the executive cabinet, and take necessary initiatives towards international student welfare.

## c. The Department of Communications

### i. Department Purpose

The Department of Communications shall promote the programs and positions of the SGA.

### ii. Department Director

The Department Director shall be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Legislature. The Director shall be responsible for overseeing and coordinating the efforts of the Executive Branch pertaining to media relations, social media, graphic design, photography, and other outreach initiatives.

## d. The Department of the Exterior

### i. Department Purpose

The Department of the Exterior shall advocate for the position of the SGA as it pertains to city, state, or federal affairs, as defined by a Joint or Concurring Resolution passed by the Legislature, or by the SGA President in the absence of such a resolution.

#### ii. Department Director

The Department Director shall be appointed by the SGA President with the advice and consent of the Legislature. The Director shall be responsible for ensuring that the purpose of the Department of the Exterior is carried out and for overseeing the higher education advocacy efforts of the SGA.

Section 4: This act shall become effective when passed in accordance with the SGA Constitution.

### CONGRESSIONAL BILL CB-105-30 SENATE BILL GS21-43

### AS INTRODUCED

## An Act of Legislation amending the Code Annotated to reform and reorganize petitioning procedures and Regulations; amending Executive Branch responsibilities with regard to petitions; providing for short title, providing for codification, and providing for an effective date.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

Title: This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Constituent Recommended Initiative & Student Petition Act of 2021."
Purpose: The purpose of this act shall be to reorganize and reform petitioning procedures and regulations within the SGA Code Annotated, to allow the submission of general petitions, establish a verified petitioning platform, and alter responsibilities within the Executive Branch with regard to petition procedures and response.
AMENDATORY: Remove all text from the Code Annotated § Title I, Chapter 3, Section 11, Subsections D to I.
AMENDATORY: The Code Annotated § Title I, Chapter 3, Section 11, Subsection C is amended as follows. For the purposes of this bill, all deletions are marked by a strikethrough and all additions are marked with an <u>underline</u> .
<b>C. Amendment Proposed by Initiative</b> The SGA Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of those students voting on the proposed amendment, provided that the amendment has been proposed to the voters in compliance with petitioning procedures explained in Title VII of the SGA <u>Code Annotated</u> . by a petition bearing the signatures of SGA members equivalent to fifteen percent (15%) of the total number voting in the last election for Student President.

**Section 5:** AMENDATORY: The Code Annotated § Title III, Chapter 5, Section 24, Subsection A is amended as follows. For the purposes of this bill, all deletions are marked by a strikethrough and all additions are marked with an <u>underline</u>.

- a. The Department of the Interior
  - i. Department Purpose

The Department of the Interior shall advocate for the position of the SGA as it pertains to internal university affairs. SGA policy shall be defined by a Joint or Concurring Resolution passed by the Legislative Branch, or by the SGA President in the absence of such a resolution. The Department shall address on-campus issues including, but not limited to, student parking, student health and wellness, and oncampus sustainability issues.

## ii. Department Director

The Department Director shall be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Legislature. The Director shall be responsible for ensuring that the purpose of the Department of the Interior is carried out, and for ensuring the creation and upkeep of a guide to petitioning.

- <u>Guide to Petitioning</u> Such a guide shall include instructions for accessing the petitioning platform, creating and formatting petitions on the petitioning platform, properly exporting petition signatures, and submission to the General Counsel's Office. Such a guide should direct petitioners to compliance with all appropriate regulations and be as easy to understand as practicable. This guide shall be published and made available to students through the SGA website.
- **Section 6:** AMENDATORY: A new subsection shall be added to the Code Annotated § Title III, Chapter 2, Section 7 of the Student Government Association Code Annotated as follows.
  - g. <u>Responding to Petitions</u>

<u>The SGA President shall be responsible for drafting and publishing responses to general</u> petitions. Upon notification of certification of a general petition by five-hundred (500) students, the SGA President shall produce and distribute a response to the petition.
 Such a response must be posted on the SGA Website no more than five (5) academic days after notification of validation from the General Counsel.

- **Section 7:** AMENDATORY: Remove all text from all sections of the Code Annotated § Title VII, Chapter 1.
- **Section 8:** AMENDATORY: The Code Annotated § Title VII, Chapter 1, Section 24, Subsection A is amended as follows. For the purposes of this bill, all deletions are marked by a strikethrough and all additions are marked with an <u>underline</u>.

## 1. <u>Definitions</u>

- a. Initiative Petition A petition that seeks to place legislation (*i.e.*, a bill or resolution) on the ballot for the student body to vote upon. An initiative petition may also place SGA constitutional amendments on the ballot for the student body to ratify or reject. Any member of the SGA may initiate legislation provided that the proposed legislation bears the valid signatures of members of the SGA equal to fifteen percent (15%) of the number of students voting in the last general election. Such legislation shall be brought before the Legislative Branch for a vote. If rejected by the Legislative Branch, it shall as soon as practicable be put before a vote of the SGA and a majority shall be required for its passage.
- b. <u>Recall Petition A petition that seeks to place an elected SGA official on the</u> ballot for retention before their term of office has expired. The members of the

SGA may recall any elected SGA official if the petition providing for recall election shall be signed by the number of members of the SGA equal to twenty-five (25%) of the total voters in district in the last general election. The text of the petition shall be in the format: "We, the undersigned, petition for the recall of the following official: (name)." The question to be placed on the ballot shall be "Shall (name) be retained as (name of office)?"

- c. Petition for a Presidential General Meeting A petition that calls for a Presidential General Session of the SGA. Such a petition must contain the valid of ten percent (10%) of the members of the SGA. The text of the petition shall be in the format: "We, the undersigned, petition for a Presidential General Meeting of the SGA." Upon certification, the SGA President must call and preside over a general meeting of the SGA.
- d. General Petition A petition that seeks to determine the position of SGA leadership or request action be taken. General Petitions may not be considered initiative petitions but should be used to call for action from the SGA on an issue specified within the petition. General Petitions must not be placed on any ballot for the student body to vote upon and are solely to be used to determine positions of or request action from SGA leadership. The text of the petition shall be in the format: "We, the undersigned, formally petition for a response from SGA regarding the following issue: (insert up to 200-word description here)." Upon certification of such a petition by 500 students, the Executive Branch of SGA shall produce and distribute a response to the petition. Such a response must be posted on the SGA Website no more than five (5) academic days after notification of certification from the General Counsel.
- e. <u>Proposition A constitutional amendment, legislation, or recall language the</u> <u>Petitioner seeks to place on the ballot for the student body to vote upon.</u>
- f. <u>Summary of the Proposition The substance, essence, or action, in summary, of the effect of the Proposition. The Summary of the Proposition accurately</u> reflects the Proposition, much as an abstract reflects its larger article. The Summary of the Proposition shall serve as the ballot question, and;
  - i. Must not exceed two hundred (200) words;
  - ii. <u>Must explain in common language, which can be easily found in</u> <u>dictionaries of general usage, the effect of the Proposition;</u>
  - iii. <u>Must not contain any words that have a special meaning for a particular</u> profession or trade not commonly known to the OU student body;
  - iv. <u>Must not reflect partiality in its composition or contain any argument</u> for or against the Proposition;
  - v. <u>Must contain language which clearly states that a "yes" vote is a vote in</u> favor of the Proposition and a "no" vote is a vote against the <u>Proposition</u>;
  - vi. <u>Must not contain language whereby a "yes" vote is a vote against the</u> <u>Proposition and a "no" vote is a vote in favor of the Proposition.</u>
- g. <u>Petitioner An enrolled student at the University of Oklahoma Norman</u> <u>Campus who uses the initiative petition or recall petition process as provided</u> <u>for in Article VII of the SGA Constitution.</u>
- h. <u>Petition Circulation Period A period of time beginning on the date that the</u> <u>first signature is collected and ending ninety (90) days, when class is in session,</u> <u>later.</u>
- i. <u>Petition Summary An automatically generated report from the Petitioning</u> <u>Platform, containing the names and OU ID numbers of all signatories, in</u> <u>compliance with the guide to petitioning produced by the Department of the</u> <u>Interior.</u>

- j. <u>Petitioning Platform The accessible internet platform on which signatures</u> <u>must be collected. Engage shall serve as the petitioning platform.</u>
- k. <u>Signature In order for a signature to be considered valid, it must contain the</u> name of the signatory as well as their OU ID number and an affirmation that their submission is freely produced.
- Petition Certification A determination of the SGA General Counsel that a sufficient number of signatures required for initiative petitions or recall petitions as provided for in Article VII of the SGA Constitution have been submitted by the Petitioner.
- m. <u>Academic Day A day which classes are in session.</u>
- 2. <u>Procedures for Petitioning</u>
  - a. <u>Initiative Petition Procedure</u>
    - i. <u>Petitioners must submit the following to the SGA General Counsel,</u> <u>hereinafter referred to as General Counsel, prior to collecting</u> <u>signatures:</u>
      - 1. <u>A true and exact copy of the Proposition</u>
      - 2. <u>A true and exact copy of the Summary of the Proposition.</u>
    - ii. <u>The General Counsel shall have five (5) academic days to review the</u> proposed Summary of the Proposition and determine whether it <u>complies with this Title.</u>
    - iii. <u>The General Counsel shall have the authority to modify or rewrite</u> completely the Summary of the Proposition to ensure that it complies with all regulations.
    - iv. The General Counsel shall not have authority to modify, in any way, the Proposition itself.
    - v. <u>The Petitioner may withdraw their petition at any time until</u> <u>Certification.</u>
    - vi. <u>Upon initial submission and review, the General Counsel shall post the</u> <u>final Summary of the Proposition as well as a true and exact copy of the</u> <u>Proposition in a conspicuous place inside the SGA Offices and shall</u> <u>transmit a copy of the same to the Petitioner, SGA President, Chair of</u> <u>the Undergraduate Student Congress, Chair of the Graduate Student</u> <u>Senate, and editor of the primary campus newspaper.</u>
    - vii. Upon posting of the aforementioned Summary of the Proposition and the Proposition, any member of SGA who is dissatisfied with the wording of the Summary of the Proposition statement may, within seven (7) academic days, appeal to the Superior Court. After such an appeal is filed, the Court shall uphold the sufficiency of the proposed Summary of the Proposition statement, make corrections to the Summary of the Proposition statement, or draft a new Summary of the Proposition statement. Should there be no appeal within the seven (7) academic days allotted for such an appeal or once the Court has ruled, there shall be no further challenge to the petition on the basis of the Summary of the Proposition statement.
    - viii. After the posting requirements mentioned in vi. and vii. are met, the General Counsel must notify the petitioner of the posting and inform them that signature collection may begin.
    - ix. The Summary of the Proposition shall appear at the beginning of the electronic form on the Petitioning Platform.
    - x. <u>Petitioners may utilize up to the entire Petition Circulation Period to</u> <u>collect signatures but must not exceed it.</u>

- xi. <u>Petitioners must submit a Petition Summary to the SGA General</u> <u>Counsel no later than five (5) academic days after the conclusion of the</u> <u>Petition Circulation Period.</u>
- b. <u>Recall Petition, General Petition, and Petition for a Presidential General</u> <u>Meeting</u>
  - i. <u>Petitioners shall not need to submit any materials prior to collecting signatures.</u>
  - ii. <u>Prior to collecting signatures, Petitioners may request a review from the</u> <u>General Counsel to ensure compliance with all relevant regulations.</u>
  - iii. <u>The General Counsel shall have five (5) academic days to review all</u> submitted materials and determine whether they comply with relevant regulations, then notify the petitioner of the determination.
  - iv. Should the Petitioner request a review from the General Counsel, they must not collect signatures until the General Counsel notifies them of a determination.
  - v. <u>The full text of the petition shall appear at the beginning of the form</u> <u>through which signatures are collected on the petitioning platform.</u>
  - vi. <u>Petitioners may utilize up to the entire Petition Circulation Period to</u> <u>collect signatures but must not exceed it.</u>
  - vii. <u>Petitioners must submit a Petition Summary to the SGA General</u> <u>Counsel no later than five (5) academic days after the conclusion of the</u> <u>Petition Circulation Period.</u>
- c. Certification of Collection of Signatures Every Petition Summary must be submitted along with the following statement:
   "I, (name), hereby attest: That I am a currently enrolled student at the University of Oklahoma Norman Campus and that the signatories to this petition have correctly and validly submitted their name and OU ID number, and that each signatory is a legal voter of the SGA."
- d. <u>Submissions Submission of all materials must be in the form of PDF or Word</u> <u>Documents emailed to the General Counsel.</u>
- e. <u>Petition Circulation Period Regulations</u>
  - i. <u>If the Petitioner does not submit the Petition Summary to the General</u> <u>Counsel within five (5) academic days following the end of the Petition</u> <u>Circulation Period, then the signatures the Petitioner has collected shall</u> <u>be null and void.</u>
  - ii. <u>The Petitioner, at any time before the final submission of signatures,</u> may withdraw their petition upon written notification to the General <u>Counsel.</u>
  - iii. <u>A Petitioner may terminate the circulation period early at any time</u> <u>during Petition Circulation Period by properly submitting the Petition</u> <u>Summary along with the signed statement.</u>
- 3. <u>Certification Process</u>
  - a. Upon proper receipt of the Petition Summary and signed statement, the General Counsel shall begin the certification process. The General Counsel must make or cause to be made a count of the number of signatures on the Petition Packets submitted by the Petitioner. The General Counsel shall ensure that the count is conducted within a reasonable amount of time. In making such count, the General Counsel shall not include:
    - i. Signatures of non-students
    - ii. <u>Duplicate signatures</u>
    - iii. <u>Submissions not meeting the definition of a signature as defined in this</u> <u>Title.</u>

- iv. Signatures for which the name and OU ID number do not match.
- v. <u>Signatures which the General Counsel has reason to believe were</u> <u>submitted by any person other than the listed signatory.</u>
- b. <u>The General Counsel must notify, in writing, the SGA President, Chair of the</u> <u>Undergraduate Student Congress, the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate,</u> <u>and the Chair of the Campus Activities Council of any and all violations of this</u> <u>Title of which they have knowledge.</u>
- c. If the General Counsel certifies an Initiative petition or Recall Petition, then the General Counsel shall post the Proposition in a conspicuous place in the SGA Offices and notify the Legislative Branch. All campaigning regarding referendums, initiatives, recalls, or constitutional amendments shall be subject to the guidelines set forth elsewhere in the SGA Code Annotated. If the General Counsel rejects a submitted Initiative Petition or Recall Petition as invalid, then the General Counsel shall submit a written report or make a personal appearance at the next regularly scheduled meetings of the Undergraduate Student Congress and Graduate Student Senate explaining grounds for the rejection. The decision of the General Counsel may be appealed by the Petitioner or the Legislative Branch, via concurring resolution, to the SGA Superior Court.
- 4. <u>Referendum</u>

Any bill being considered for passage by the Legislative Branch may, by a majority vote of the Legislative Branch, be referred to the members of the SGA for their approval. In such case, the Legislative Branch shall provide for the publication of such bill and its general dissemination among the members of the SGA at least one week prior to such election. For such bill to be enacted, it must receive a majority of the votes cast unless more stringent requirements are set by the Legislative Branch and fifteen percent (15%) of the total number of eligible voters shall have participated in such election. Balloting on such bill shall take place at such time and in such manner as provided by Congress, and the result of such an election shall be binding upon the Legislative Branch.

- a. <u>Content of Referendum Proposal: A referendum proposal must specifically</u> <u>state the purpose of sending the legislation or Constitutional Amendment to the</u> <u>SGA members for a referendum vote.</u>
- b. <u>Ballot Explanation: The SGA General Counsel may write an explanation to appear on a referendum ballot.</u>
- 5. Constitutional Amendment

The SGA Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of those students voting on the proposed amendment provided that the amendment shall have been presented to them by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of each House of the Legislative Branch at least three weeks prior to the election at which the amendment is to be voted upon. A single Act of Legislation shall be used by the Legislature in a manner consistent with Article X, Sec. 1 of the SGA Constitution to (1) propose an amendment to the SGA Constitution and (2) establish a referendum presenting said amendment. Such an Act of Legislation must pass with a two-thirds (2/3) vote of each house. Such an Act of Legislation may be used to place said referendum on the ballot of a general election, to establish a special election, or to add said referendum to the ballot of an established special election, as shall be specified in said Act of Legislation. Each amendment shall be proposed by its own Act of Legislation. If the SGA President vetoes such an Act of Legislation, it shall be considered passed over any such veto.

- Section 9: This act shall become effective when passed in accordance with the SGA Constitution.

### SENATE BILL NO. GS21-44

### AS INTRODUCED

## A Senatorial Act of Procedure amending the Graduate Student Senate Bylaws; providing short title; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION GRADUATE STUDENT SENATE:

- **Section 1:** This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Updated Procedures Act."
- **Section 2:** Purpose: The purpose of this Act shall be to amend the Bylaws of the Graduate Student Senate to provide revised policies and procedures affecting the duties of membership and general rules of senatorial operation.
- **Section 3:** AMENDATORY: Section 4 of the Graduate Student Senate Bylaws shall be removed in its entirety and replaced by the following.

## SECTION 4. Duties of Members and General Rules of Operation

- A. DUTIES. Senators shall be responsible for performing the following:
  - 1. Serve on at least one (1) standing committee, as assigned by the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate.
  - 2. Serve on any ad hoc or joint committee to which they have been appointed by the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate.
  - 3. Attend all regularly scheduled and emergency meetings of the general body and of any committee of which they are a member.
  - 4. Review all legislation before any such legislation is brought to any vote.
  - 5. Report senatorial proceedings to all constituents within their Department.
  - 6. Provide constituent service, whereby they shall be available to meet with and answer any questions had by constituents within their Department.
  - 7. All other responsibilities as provided in these Bylaws, the Constituent Documents, or other recognized source of authority.
- B. POWERS. Senators shall be empowered to perform the following:
  - 1. Introduce legislation for consideration by a committee of the Graduate Student Senate, by the general body of the Graduate Student Senate, or by the Legislative branch of the SGA.
  - 2. Vote on any legislation introduced to a committee of the Graduate Student Senate or the general body of the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, any such legislation complies with the Senate Standing Rules of Order.
  - 3. Introduce any amendment to any legislation brought for consideration by a committee of the Graduate Student Senate or the general body of the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, any such legislation complies with the Senate Standing Rules of Order.

- C. REGULARLY SCHEDULED GENERAL MEETINGS. The Chair of the Graduate Student Senate shall schedule at least seven (7) general meetings per academic semester; provided that, the first meeting of the fall academic semester shall occur upon the Sunday immediately following one (1) month from the beginning date of that academic term and the first meeting of the spring academic semester shall occur upon the second Sunday from the beginning date of that academic term.
  - 1. ORIENTATION. The Vice Chair of the Graduate Student Senate shall coordinate and lead an orientation session, which shall occur immediately prior to the first regularly scheduled general meeting of the fall academic semester.
- D. COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENT. All Senators shall be assigned to at least one (1) standing committee of the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, each standing committee is assigned at least five (5) members.
  - REGULARLY SCHEDULED STANDING COMMITTEE MEETINGS. The standing committees of the Graduate Student Senate shall regularly schedule committee meetings prior to but upon the same date of each general meeting of the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, the first meeting of the fall academic semester shall occur upon the date of the second general meeting of that academic term, and the first meeting of the spring academic semester shall occur upon that date of the first general meeting of that academic term. However, nothing in this section shall preclude any standing committee from scheduling additional meetings outside of those regularly scheduled times.
- E. ATTENDANCE. All Senators are expected to and shall make every effort to attend all meetings of the general body of the Graduate Student Senate and of the committee(s) to which they are assigned or appointed.
  - 1. REPORTING ATTENDANCE. Attendance for regularly scheduled general meetings shall be taken by or reported to the Secretary of the Graduate Student Senate at some point during regularly scheduled committee meetings; provided that, failure to attend a regularly scheduled general meeting shall constitute an absence, regardless of previously recorded attendance taken during a regularly scheduled committee meeting. The Secretary of the Graduate Student Senate shall regularly distribute a list of the number of absences accrued by each Senator every two (2) weeks to the body of the Graduate Student Senate.
  - ABSENCES. All Senators shall be permitted one (1) absence per academic semester and one (1) floating absence that may be applied for either academic semester, totaling three (3) absences per legislative Session.
  - 3. PROXIES. If a Senator has prior knowledge they may be absent for a regularly scheduled committee or general meeting, the Senator may appoint a proxy to attend such meeting or meetings.
    - a. ELIGIBILITY. Proxies may only be appointed from among the members of the Department the Senator represents.
    - b. POWERS. Upon appointment, a proxy shall have all the powers and rights of the Senator for whom they represent; provided that, the Senator has signed and filed a Proxy Request Form prior to such meeting or meetings.
  - 4. DEPARTMENT STATUS. Attendance at regularly scheduled committee and general meetings shall be used to determine Department Status, which refers to the eligibility of members of a Department to receive funding from the Graduate Student Senate's Conference Travel and Research Grants.

- a. GOOD STANDING. Good Standing shall only occur if a Senator maintains good attendance, which shall mean the Senator has not exceeded the allotted number of absences per academic semester. Only one (1) Senator from a Department must individually fulfill the attendance requirement to maintain Good Standing. If a Department is represented by two (2) Senators, those Senators may not combine attendance records to fulfill the attendance requirements to maintain Good Standing.
- b. PROBATION. If a Senator does not maintain good attendance during one (1) academic semester, which shall mean the Senator has exceeded the allotted number of absences per academic semester, the Senator shall be on probation from that moment through the following academic semester. If a Department is represented by only one (1) Senator and such Senator fails to maintain good attendance during one (1) academic semester, the Department shall be on probation. Similarly, if a Department is represented by two (2) Senators and both such Senators fail to maintain good attendance during one (1) academic semester, the Department shall be on probation. If a Senator or Senators, as applicable, fail to maintain good attendance during the subsequent academic semester following a notice of probation, the Department shall fall into Bad Standing.
- c. BAD STANDING. If a Department does not provide representation to the Graduate Student Senate, the Department shall automatically fall into Bad Standing. If a Senator or Senators, as applicable, fail to maintain good attendance during the subsequent academic semester following a notice of probation, the Department shall fall into Bad Standing. If a Department submits representation to a following legislation session or its representation maintains good attendance during the probationary period, the Department may move into Good Standing, if in accordance with the aforementioned requirements for obtaining Good Standing.
- **Section 4:** AMENDATORY: Section 5 of the Bylaws of the Graduate Student Senate Bylaws shall be removed in its entirety, as indicated by a strikethrough.

### SECTION 5. Proxies

- A. If a Senator is going to be absent from a G.A.M. OR Committee Meeting, the Senator may send a Proxy to the missed G.A.M.
- B. The sending of a Proxy does not count as an absence.
- C. For that missed Meeting, a Proxy shall have all of the powers of the represented Senator as long as the following condition is met:
  - 1. The Proxy must come to the Meeting with the Proxy Request Form completed by and signed by the Senator missing the G.A.M.
- Section 5: This Act shall become effective when passed in accordance with the SGA Constitution.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION GRADUATE STUDENT SENATE:

- Section 1: This act may be known and cited as the "Spring 2021 Departmental Status Act."
- Section 2: Purpose: To update Graduate Student Senate Department status for the full academic year 2020-2021.
- **Section 3:** AMENDATORY: For the purpose of this Act, Departments now in 'Bad Standing' will be found under the 'Bad Standing' column; Departments now on 'probation' will be found under the 'Probation' column; and Departments now in 'Good Standing' will be found under the 'Good Standing' column.
- **Section 4:** Departments with status changes:

#### AS INTRODUCED

## A Senatorial Act of Procedure amending the Graduate Student Senate Bylaws; providing short title; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION GRADUATE STUDENT SENATE:

- Section 1: This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Resignations and Removals Act."
- **Section 2:** Purpose: The purpose of this Act shall be to amend the Bylaws of the Graduate Student Senate to provide revised policies and procedures affecting resignations and removals of Senators in the Graduate Student Senate.
- **Section 3:** AMENDATORY: Section 3 of the Graduate Student Senate Bylaws shall be removed in its entirety and replaced by the following.

### **SECTION 3. Resignations and Removals**

- A. RESIGNATION. Any Senator shall be permitted to resign from office as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate, whereupon the procedures providing for special appointed in Subsection 2 of Subsection E of Section 2 of these Bylaws shall apply.
  - 1. VOLUNTARY RESIGNATION. Any Senator may voluntarily resign from office as a Senator without reservation. Upon resignation, the Senator shall furnish a letter of resignation to the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate and to the Chair of the Internal Affairs Committee, providing the date of their resignation and identifying the Department of which they represent.
  - 2. INVOLUNTARY RESIGNATION. Any Department shall be permitted to request the removal of a Senator that represents such Department by submitting a request to remove to the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate, however, the bases of such removal shall be the responsibility of the Department. Upon receipt of a request to remove, the Senator at issue shall be informed of their removal by their Department, notwithstanding any prior knowledge of such act, wherefore the Senator shall submit a letter of resignation to the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate and the Chair of the Internal Affairs Committee.
- B. REMOVAL. Any Senator may be removed from office in the Graduate Student Senate, whereupon the procedures providing for special appointment in Subsection 2 of Subsection E of Section 2 of these Bylaws shall apply, unless indicated elsewhere.
  - 1. REMOVAL FROM ELECTED OFFICE OF SENATE. The Graduate Student Senate shall be empowered to remove any elected officer from such office in the Graduate Student Senate in accordance with the following provisions.
    - a. RECOMMENDATION OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The Executive Committee, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote, may furnish a resolution to the body of the Graduate Student Senate recommending the removal of an elected officer, upon which the elected officer in question shall be temporarily relieved of all duties

and authority until the Graduate Student Senate has issued a vote on the matter. Such resolution shall appear under "New Business" on the agenda at the next occurring general meeting following the Executive Committee's issuance of such resolution, whereby a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the body of the Graduate Student Senate shall be require to remove such elected officer from such office.

- i. REPRESENTATION. Any elected officer removed from such office shall continue to represent their Department, unless such elected officer is also removed from office as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, if such elected office is the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate, the Chair shall also be removed from the Graduate Student Senate.
- b. RECOMMENDATION OF A SENATOR. Any Senator may issue a complaint to remove an elected officer from such office.
  - i. REVIEW OF COMPLAINT. Such complaint shall be directed to the Internal Affairs Committee, which shall begin a review of such elected officer and the merits of such complaint upon receipt. The Internal Affairs Committee shall have a period of two (2) weeks to conduct such review, at which point the complaint shall either be failed in committee or recommended to the body of the Graduate Student Senate for disposition. During the review period, the elected officer in question shall be temporarily relieved of all duties and authority until either the Internal Affairs Committee or the Graduate Student Senate has issued a vote on the matter.
  - ii. RECOMMENDATION OF THE INTERNAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE. If the Internal Affairs Committee recommends that the complaint be brought before the body of the Graduate Student Senate, such complaint and the recommendation of the Internal Affairs Committee shall appear under "Special Orders" on the agenda at the next occurring general meeting following the conclusion of the review period.
  - iii. VOTING. A two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the body of the Graduate Student Senate shall be required to remove an elected officer from such office.
  - iv. REPRESENTATION. Any elected officer removed from such office shall continue to represent their Department, unless such elected officer is also removed from office as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, if such elected office is the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate, the Chair shall also be removed from the Graduate Student Senate.
- 2. REMOVAL FROM OFFICE OF SENATE. The Graduate Student Senate shall be empowered to remove any Senator from office as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate in accordance with the following provisions.
  - a. INADEQUATE ATTENDANCE. If a Senator or Senators exceed the allotted number of absences per academic semester by three (3) additional absences, totaling five (5) absences per academic semester, the Executive Committee, by a majority vote, may author a resolution to remove such Senator or Senators from office in the Graduate Student Senate; provided that, the Executive Committee has exhausted its efforts to inform the Senator of their violation of these provisions.
    - i. RESOLUTION. Such resolution shall appear under "Special Orders" on the agenda and shall be in order at any regularly scheduled general meeting.

- ii. VOTING. A majority vote of the body of the Graduate Student Senate shall be required to remove a Senator from office as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate on grounds of inadequate attendance.
- iii. NOTICE OF REMOVAL. If such Senator is removed from the Graduate Student Senate, the Chair of the Internal Affairs Committee shall inform the Senator and the Department of which they represent of such removal, pursuant to the special appointment procedures provided elsewhere in these Bylaws.
- b. DERELICTION OF DUTY. Any Senator may author a resolution to remove a Senator from office as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate on grounds of dereliction of duty, which shall include, without limitation, negligence, misconduct, and other similar actions; provided that, such resolution to remove the Senator in question is co-sponsored by not less than ten (10) additional Senators.
  - i. RESOLUTION. Such resolution shall appear under "Special Orders" on the agenda and shall be in order at any regularly scheduled general meeting; provided that, such resolution has appeared before the Executive Committee for review prior to its introduction to the body of the Graduate Student Senate.
  - ii. VOTING. A two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the body of the Graduate Student Senate shall be required to remove a Senator from as a Senator in the Graduate Student Senate on grounds of dereliction of duty.
  - iii. NOTICE OF REMOVAL. If such Senator is removed from the Graduate Student Senate, the Chair of the Internal Affairs Committee shall inform the Senator and the Department of which they represent of such removal, pursuant to the special appointment procedures provided elsewhere in these Bylaws.
- **Section 4:** AMENDATORY: Section 12 of the Bylaws of the Graduate Student Senate Bylaws shall be removed in its entirety, as indicated by a strikethrough.

### SECTION 12. Dismissal of Elected Officers or Committee Chairs

- A. An elected officer or committee chair may be dismissed by the following procedures:
  - 1. Committee Chair
    - a. A majority vote of the effected committee is sufficient to remove the committee chair or
    - b. EC may remove a committee chair with a three-fourths majority vote.
    - c. The effected committee chair may appeal either the committee's or EC's decision to the Senate. The appeal must pass by a two-thirds majority of the Active Membership or the dismissal decision stands.
  - 2. Elected Officer
    - a. By a two-thirds vote, the EC may send a resolution to the Senate recommending dismissal. Until the Senate has voted on the matter, the officer shall be temporarily relieved of all duties and authority. The resolution shall be the first order of new business at the next G.A.M. A two thirds majority of the Active Membership vote shall be required to remove the officer.

- b. Any Senator may motion to remove an officer. Once moved and seconded, the motion immediately goes to the Internal Affairs Committee for review. After review, the Internal Affairs Committee may forward the motion to the Senate for disposition or fail the motion in committee. The Chair shall read the recommendation or disposition of the motion as the first order of new business at the next G.A.M. If the motion fails, the author may appeal to the Senate shall hear the motion or not. The Senate shall hear the motion if a majority of the Senators grant the appeal. If the motion to remove comes before the Senate, the officer shall temporarily step down until the matter is resolved. A two-thirds majority vote shall be required to remove the officer. If the Chair is the subject of the removal motion, the Chair shall temporarily step-aside at the beginning of the G.A.M..
- 3. Appointed Officer

a. All appointed officers may be removed by the Chair without appeal.

- 4. Except for an appointed officer, all resolutions or motions to remove an officer shall follow proper protocol and the Standing Rules of Order.
- 5. All officers or committee chairs, except for the Chair of the Senate, removed from office shall continue to represent their respective Departments unless expelled by the Senate. The Chair of the Senate, if removed, is expelled from the Senate.
- Section 5: This Act shall become effective when passed in accordance with the SGA Constitution.
