- GS21-01 Big XII, BIG Responsibilities Act of 2020
 - Motion to move GS21-01 to floor by Senator Rocha (53), seconded by Senator Reynolds (98)
 - Author Savanah Patterson (Congress Chair): The purpose of this act shall be to establish the Vice Chair of Undergraduate Student Congress as the head of the OU delegation at Big XII SGA conferences.
 - o Yields time for question
 - Senator Israel (81): Who currently oversaw these responsibilities?

- Author: It was a conglomeration of a couple of people, it's usually the executive branch, typically President or Chief of Staff, but the Vice President is better suited to plan this big event.
- O Senator Woodworth (108): Motion to pass by unanimous consent.
- o Seconded by Senator Bonine (107)
- No objections
- Motion passes
- GS21-02 Fall 2020 Special Election for the Academic District Range Amendment Act of 2020
 - Motion to move GS21-02 to floor by Senator Reimer (105), seconded by Senator Waterman (78)
 - O Authors Bailey Ownby (Congressional Administration Vice Chair), Foster Hillis (Congressional Administration Chair), and Savanah Patterson (Undergraduate Congress member: The University of Oklahoma Student Government Association's (UOSGA) Undergraduate Student Congress and Graduate Student Senate passed the "Academic District Range Amendment of 2020" (CB-103-30, GS20-22). The amendment was passed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of each House of the Legislative Branch in accordance with the Constitution, and now requires a vote by the whole SGA.
 - Yields time for question
 - Senator Israel (81): Can you give me a recap of the original bill?
 - Author: Yes, it was adjusting the academic districts in Congress. This changes it from 14 to 18.
 - Senator Israel (81): Friendly amendment to send it to change the wording to the election commission.
 - Senator Mallick (119): Motion to pass by unanimous consent.
 - O Seconded by Senator Woodworth (108)
 - No objections
 - Motion passes
- GS21-03 Chief of Staff appointment Adjustment Act of 2021
 - Motion to move GS21 -03 to floor by Senator Woodworth (108), seconded by Senator Omoumi (40)
 - O Authors Melissa Maxey (GSS Chair) Tavana Farzaneh (SGA President), Alex Gray (SGA Vice President), Cricket Kaya (Interim Chief of Staff), and Coy Taylor (Congress Associate): The purpose of this act shall be to change the process of appointing the Chief of Staff; since Chiefs of Staff are traditionally the known by the President and Vice President Elect before their swearing in.
 - o Yields time for question
 - o Senator Woodworth (108): Motion to pass by unanimous consent.
 - o Seconded by Senator Waterman (78)
 - No objections
 - Motion passes
- GS21-04 Act Appointing the Spring 2021 SGA Election Commissioner 2.0
 - Motion to move GS21 -04 to floor by Senator Reimer (105), seconded by Senator Bonine (107)
 - Authors Tavana Farzaneh (SGA President), Alex Gray (SGA Vice President), and Cricket Kaya (SGA Interim Chief of Staff): The purpose of this act shall be to appoint the Spring 2021 Election Commissioner following the resignation of the 2020 – 2021 Election Commissioner.
 - Yields time for question
 - Senator Israel (81): Has the appointment been seen by Congress yet?
 - Author: Yes, it was seen last week and it had to be reworked, and that's why it's called "20"
 - Senator Israel (81): Could you elaborate on why there was a rec of due fail?

- Author: Yes, the biggest thing was a misunderstanding on my part, but we do stick
 with our appointment of Joy Nath because of his strong understanding of the election
 process.
- Senator Mallick (119): Can Joy introduce himself?
- Joy Nath introduces himself.
- Senator Israel (81): When were interviews conducted?
- Author: Thursday of last week.
- Senator Israel (81): To confirm, you said Joy was the only applicant after you opened the interviews?
- Author: No, there were 4 applicants that we interviewed after the bill had failed. Initially we did no interviews.
- O Senator Bonine (107): Motion to pass by unanimous consent.
- o Seconded by Senator Reimer (105)

- GS21-05 Auxiliary Allocation 10 Act of 2020-2021
 - Motion to move GS21 -05 to floor by Senator Tennell (37), seconded by Senator Ashbaker (71)
 - Author Lauren Patton (SGA Budget Chair): The purpose of this act is to appropriate the funds
 of the University of Oklahoma Student Government Association to the organizations
 mentioned within.
 - O Also, primary funding opens February 15th and closes March 5th. I'm happy to meet with any of you about this process if you are involved with an RSO.
 - o Yields time for question
 - Senator Woodworth (108): Could you type those dates in the chat?
 - Author: Yes.
 - Senator Mallick (119): Were these applications for events before winter break or after?
 - Author: Crimson Spirit was over the break but that doesn't matter for the funding, it can happen retroactively.
 - Senator Mallick (119): So we fund during the break?
 - Author: The event is allowed to be over the break. But they applied for it before the semester ended.
 - Senator Mallick (119): Can this happen during summer?
 - Author: It's a little bit different because we start a new year during the summer.
 - O Senator Mallick (119): Motion to pass by unanimous consent.
 - Seconded by Senator Woodworth (108)
 - No objections
 - Motion passes
- Request to see GS21-07 and GS21-08 in reverse order. Motion by Senator Ashbaker (71) and seconded by Senator Hamilton (82)
- GS21-08 Extension of Consistency in Law Act
 - Motion to move GS21 -08 to floor by Senator Ashbaker (71), seconded by Senator Hamilton (82)
 - O Authors Melissa Maxey (GSS Chair) & Dayten Israel (Internal Affairs Chair): The purpose of this Act shall be to provide an extension to the previously passed Consistency in Law Act (GF20-24) which provided a general grant of authority for a limited time to the Internal Affairs Committee of the Graduate Student Senate, so it could establish clarity and consistency in the Bylaws of the Graduate Student Senate
 - O Yields time for question
 - Senator Walton (85): Why April 30th?

- Author: It's the date Melissa put in when she made the revision. And this gives us some time before finals.
- O Senator Woodworth (108): Motion to tell everyone you can set a reaction at the bottom of zoom and pass by unanimous consent.
- o Seconded by Senator Chesbro (60)
- No objections
- Motion passes
- GS21-07 Senate Elections and Selections Act
 - Motion to move GS21 -07 to floor by Senator Linsey (7), seconded by Senator Omoumi (40)
 - O Author Dayten Israel (Internal Affairs Chair): The purpose of this Act shall be to amend the Bylaws of the Graduate Student Senate to provide revised policies and procedures affecting representation, extending to membership, departmental authority, senatorial terms, and methods of selection.
 - Yields time for question
 - Senator Woodworth (108): Friendly amendment to bring the revised version to the floor.
 - Senator Woodworth (108): Is there really a reason we need this, like to make the process harder? Some departments already have a hard time getting someone here.
 - Author: The point of this is to encourage elections rather than being mostly by appointments, which is often just a voice of the graduate liaisons. This would encourage more grad students' voices to be heard. And the people participating might be more engaged.
 - Melissa: Our bylaws already highlight that grad students should be the ones to decide, and the grad liaison can still appoint, but this emphasizes that grad students have to approve. And this also gives GSS the ability to request that committee chairs be reappointed by their department, so we have the executive committee in place before the semester starts.
 - Senator Israel (81): The senate is tasked with figuring out where departments are struggling as far as getting involvement, and this would help us see how many grad students are participating in elections. This brings up this requirement and lets us check this.
 - Senator Waterman (78): Has there been external complaints about the process?
 - Author: This is an internal observation based on years of internal complaints and frustration.
 - Melissa: And I get a lot of emails about how to get involved in cases where the liaison picks the representatives and the rest of the department doesn't have a lot of awareness of what GSS does.
 - Senator Mallick (119): My only concern is you want them to write a personal statement of 150 words?
 - Senator Israel (81): No its up to them, it's not required. Congress and executive branch and CAC do that.
 - Senator Mallick (119): Can I ask for a friendly amendment of rewording to note that it's not required?
 - Senator Israel (81): I personally don't see how that would make it clearer. Rejecting the friendly amendment because the language historically "may" is indicative of permissive. And it's on us to break this down. And were looking to make an infographic to make this more clear.
 - Senator Linsey (7): I'm curious, is it just the grad liaison or is it also the department chair?

- Senator Israel (81): From what I've seen, the grad liaison is also the grad director or registrar, and according to the way we require appointments, it requires the signature of the grad liaison so that's why we included that.
- Melissa: I communicate with the grad liaisons every semester, but not every department has one.
- Senator Linsey (7): I'd like to add a friendly amendment to include either a director or department chair.
- Senator Israel (81): I will accept a friendly amendment of all reference to grad liaison, to grad liaison, chair, or director of the department.
- Senator Waterman (78): I agree with Senator Mallick (119) to clarify that it's meant to increase participation, but I would suggest language that the personal statement and photo are optional.
- Senator Israel (81): The grad liaison is not expected to write anything, just distribute the names. We can add language clarifying that this would be submitted by the student.
- Senator Waterman (78): What's the statement going to be used for if they've already been picked by one of these options?
- Senator Linsey (81): This is just if they want to get information about their candidacy out there before they are approved. Just an explanation of what they want to do, their background, something like that. It's up to them to provide that.
- Melissa: A statement like that might also help the chair appoint them to a committee.
- Senator Wright (5): If this was passed, when would it take action?
- Senator Israel (81): It would go into effect immediately.
- Senator Wright (5): So then would it be possible to table this so we can tell our departments about this? The liaisons and fellow grad students.
- Senator Mallick (119): I agree with Senator Waterman (78) about the personal statement. That's still a lot to ask from them.
- Melissa We've gone into debate at this point but were still in questions. Any other questions?
- Senator Israel (81): It says 150 is the max, you can write less.
- Senator Mallick (119): Can I ask if the senators can vote on the wording: Add may or may not?
- Senator Israel (81): That would be an amendment. I rejected it as a friendly amendment so it would be debate.
- Senator Mallick (119): I want to enter debate.
- Melissa Do we need a second? George suggested to address other questions first.
- Senator Woodworth (108): For clarification, the main focus of this is to fix the error that departments send people chosen by liaisons that don't want to be here, when the depts have people that want to participate. Right?
- Senator Israel (81): That's just one helpful benefit of this. The entire purpose is to discourage our overreliance on appointments and encourage elections so grad students have more of a voice.
- Melissa I want to say we have gone over our question period. We can have a motion to extend it. Do we have such a motion?
- Senator Linsey (7): Motion to extend question period.
- Seconded by Senator Omoumi (40)
- Senator Linsey (7): Does this apply to current senators for this semester? Do we have to get elected this semester, or is this for next semester?
- Senator Israel (81): It goes into effect immediately but not retrospectively, so it will affect elections for next semester. The only thing it will affect this semester is the special appointments option.

- Senator Rocha (53): Did you get any more input from the liaisons? You said you saw the need from internal observations, but did you get input from them?
- Senator Israel (81): No, the grad student voices are what really matters. I don't see how this adds any undue burden to them beyond putting some names in an email.
- Senator Waterman (78): This is internally observed to be a problem, but there haven't been external comments. So, this would be changing their routine?
- Senator Israel (81): These are the bylaws of the GSS, it's up to us to determine how our members are selected. We want to put more interest on the elections.
- Senator Waterman (78): So whose concern is this? There's probably a level of passion for involvement, but that may not be matched in every department.
- Senator Israel (81): This is for GSS, I do not care about what every administrative person thinks about this, I care about every grad student having a voice.
- Melissa: so now Senator Mallick (119) can suggest her amendment.
- Senator Mallick (119): I'd like to add the wording "may or may not".
- Senator Israel (81): Can I counter with this language: Where it says may be accompanied by, Updated language is as follows: "The Senator Elect/Senator Appoint must provide their name and may choose to provide a photographic image of the Senator Elect/Senator Appoint and a personal statement of no more than 150 words." This should be provided at all reference of the photographic image and personal statement language, as according to use of "Senator Elect" and "Senator Appoint."
- Senator Mallick (119): Once we put that language in there, the departments will feel like the students should have to follow it. It's already hard to get students to participate, and adding this layer may make it more difficult.
- Senator Israel (81): I do not understand the concern. The language is permissive. This is consistent with other branches.
- Senator Woodworth (108): I agree with Senator Mallick (119), I know exactly how my advisor would read this. Departments that don't study the law may read this different. They're going to read "may" as "should".
- Senator Israel (81): may is not legalese.
- Senator Rusmore (17): Could I suggest language "candidates may choose to provide"? Then the choice is explicit.
- Senator Israel (81): The senator elect may choose to provide ...
- Senator Woodworth (108): Yeah, I would like to suggest that friendly amendment.
- Motion to end debate by Senator Mallick (119), seconded by Senator Ferraro (120)
- Senator Israel (81): Motion to table this so we have time to talk to our department.
- Seconded by Senator Waterman (78)
- Objection: Chesbro (60)
- Now we vote (yes, means I want to table)
