Mayes: The 33rd President of the United States, Harry S. Truman once said, "It is amazing what you can accomplish if you do not care who gets the credit." No quote is more vatic when it comes to describing the life and journey of Bayard Rustin. Born March 17, 1912 in West Chester, Pennsylvania, he was the 9th of 12 children born to a Quaker family. His grandmother, Julia Rustin, was a prominent member of the NAACP, who entertained many of the most preeminent activists of the day including W.E.B DuBois and James Weldon Johnson. These influences at such an early age proved great in the force they applied on Rustin's philosophy and mind.

In his younger years, Rustin was open about his sexuality, but unlike many others he found acceptance in his family, most importantly from his grandmother, who when told by Rustin of the fondness he held for his male friends responded, "I suppose that's what you need to do." After his expulsion from Wilberforce University, he moved to Harlem where he began working to defend and help to secure the release and freedom of the Scottsboro Boys. After a brief stint with the Communist Party, Rustin joined the Socialist Party and was taken under the tutelage of Norman Thomas. He, Thomas and A. Philip Randolph pressured FDR to sign Executive Order 8802 (Fair Employment Act) which prohibited discrimination on racial and ethnic grounds in the defense industry.

Back in the South, while on a bus trip from Louisville to Nashville, Rustin sat in the second row of seats, an area exclusive to white passengers. He forthrightly refused to abandon his seat. When asked on his reasoning he expounded, "As I was going by the second seat to go to the rear, a white child reached out for the ring necktie I was wearing and pulled it, whereupon its mother said, 'Don't touch a nigger.' If I go and sit quietly at the back of that bus now, that child, who was so innocent of race relations that it was going to play with me, will have seen so many blacks go in the back and sit down quietly that it's going to end up saying, 'They like it back there, I've never seen anybody protest against it.' I owe it to that child, not only to my own dignity, I owe it to that child, that it should be educated to know that blacks do not want to sit in the back, and therefore I should get arrested, letting all these white people in the bus know that I do not accept that." Just North of Nashville Rustin was dragged and beaten by police officers, arrested but released uncharged.

After his release from prison in 1946, for violating the Selective Service Act, he made a pilgrimage to India to learn the techniques of nonviolent civil resistance from the fosterlings of Gandhi. One individual who commanded the most attention from Rustin was Krishnalal Shridharani, whose guide War without Violence, greatly mastered and codified the philosophy of non-violence. With this knowledge, Rustin orchestrated the Journey of Reconciliation, dubbed the first freedom ride. This included 8 black and 8 white participants who journeyed from D.C. to Raleigh to test the recently ruled Morgan v. Virginia case. This led to the eventual arrest of all 16 participants. In 1953 Rustin was arrested and charged with engaging in an act of sexual perversion with another man in Pasadena. Following a 2-month jail sentence Rustin resigned from many of his positions and was ostracized by his former friends. In 1956 he began collaborating with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., teaching him on lessons of nonviolent civil disobedience. He convinced Dr. King to abandon all contrivances that weren't nonviolent and even to eschew home protection. But Rustin never fully gained the trust of many leaders in the Civil Rights Movement, who surmised and felt trepidatious that Rustin's past would bring unwanted negative attention to their collective cause. On many occasions Rustin's homosexuality would be used as a cudgel against him. Rustin's most lasting contribution to this nation, in a sea of many contributions, was his work as the main organizer of the 1963 March on Washington. He was responsible for planning every minute of the march including training off-duty police officers as marshals, and training bus drivers to direct traffic.

After this Rustin continued to play an indelible role on the course the Civil Rights Movement took, including organizing the NYC School Boycott and advocating for the Fair Housing Act. Rustin's willingness to cede the spotlight and his contemporaries (Strom Thurmond) propensity to delegitimize his contributions and impugn his character simply because he was gay, forced Rustin to fade behind the history books. He would die on August 24, 1987, a man lonely in history and forgotten by many. He would be posthumously awarded the presidential Medal of Freedom in 2013 by President Obama, and just 6 days ago, but 67 years too late, Governor Gavin Newsom of California pardoned Rustin's 1953 conviction.

AS INTRODUCED

An Act of Procedure establishing committee membership; providing short title; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT CONGRESS:

AS INTRODUCED

An act relating to appropriations; providing for short title; stating purpose; appropriating Auxiliary Funding for the 2019-2020 process; stating appropriation guidelines; establishing expiration deadline; directing transfer of unused funds by deadline; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

Section 1: This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Auxiliary Allocation 14 Act of 2019-2020"

Section 2: PURPOSE. The purpose of this act is to appropriate the funds of the University of Oklahoma Student Government Association to the organizations mentioned within.
