- CB-115-23 “Spring 2026 Uncontested Elections Rework Act” (Wang)

Author’s Explanation:

Election Commissioner Wang: There is a part in the Code Annotated that talks about when we can there's a deadline for when it's actually on the ballot. And so what that means is just it's either within five days of the elections or within two hours following the closing of the polls. Now the original language there was hours of the close of the polls, which might be a little bit unclear. I can tell you that I definitely misread it on my first pass through. There have been multiple superior court rulings that have said that, yes, that actually refers to the 48 hours after the polls have closed. So I am explicitly saying following the closing of the polls just making sure there's no uncertainty. So that's that. Now for the big thing. So in general provisions, there is a stipulation about the prefer not to vote option. So those of you who know the ballot know that in when there was an uncontested election, there's going to be a prefer not to option. What that implies, the name itself, is an abstention, but that's not what's practically used for. Not to vote has been intended to be used as a direct negation against the candidate. If you don't get more votes than prefer not to vote in your uncontested election, you do not win that decision. Pretty clear. So I'm changing to the no candidate option. I am also going to expand it to cover not only uncontested elections, but also elections where there are less people running than open positions. The main judgment behind that is I feel like there are times where you know, when it's an uncontested election and you're guaranteed a win. But what that ends up happening is then the candidates may not be incentivized to actually try to go out and campaign or run because they know that's guaranteed. And I don't think that's really the right kind of attitude to have towards it. We are trying to serve and understand the student body, and you can't really do it effectively if you're just saying, oh, well, guaranteed win. Good for me. And then you're sitting there doing nothing. So hopefully, that provides not only just some more sort of flexibility. More for lack of a better term, integrity protections and also just helping incentivize them to actually go out, talk to student body, see what's going on. Yeah.

- **Associate Savage:** Author, are you against still having an option for people to abstain just it being more clearly in the code so that we know what the preferred not to vote means and we know what this no means. Are you against them still having the option to abstain?

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- **Election Commissioner Wang:** I mean they can abstain if they want to. To my knowledge, it's set up to where you can check up to a certain number of options. And you could simply not vote on one.
- **Associate Savage:** What I mean is like if you want to vote for your representatives, but you don't care about the presidential election or vice versa, you have to choose one of the options. And now no candidate is still a vote now, but they just don't feel informed. Are you open to having an abstention option if they want to vote in something but not something else?
 - **Election Commissioner Wang:** Yeah, I'd be open to that. I'd probably just make another option that would be called an extension. I think that's close to it. I do think I'll probably have to add that into the code as well and etcetera bills, but I'm definitely open to that option.
- **Associate Savage:** Would the author accept a friendly amendment to add an abstention line that said specifically said this serves as an abstention to the voting?
 - **Election Commissioner Wang:** Yes.

On a motion to see CB-115-20 Gilson-Bond seconded Pitts

- CB-115-20 "Search Committee Approval Revision Act of 2026" (Thune/Newaz/Toyos-Perez) (Do Pass)

Author's Explanation:

Associate Thune: Alright. Hi, guys. All we changed is we put a strike through that this can be approved through email or in person meeting, and we did that to align with the court ruling.

Associate Newaz: The reason we are revising this is because of the superior court ruling that was made last year. They ruled it to be unconstitutional to have bicameral appointment power over electronic communication instead of the formal approval through the legislative chambers.

Representative Toyos: I'm looking for a friendly amendment to actually strike out the entire section from appointments to subcommittees without a meeting.

- **Representative Wolthuis:** Authors, I'm wondering if you happen to understand why that original section of the code was written.
 - **Representative Toyos:** Yeah. I know the process of appointing people to search committees can be very time constraining. Like, they want in a couple hours, but we're just doing this online with the court order that ruled it unconstitutional. We can have a statute that's unconstitutional. We just can't follow it. So we're just making sure that our code is updated to the best of its abilities.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** Authors, do you understand why that bill was pushed through extremely fast in to actually see it in our body?
 - **Representative Rhoads:** Yeah so this is from the impeachment charges of last year. Basically, what happened is the former president Strickland he appointed a member of his cabinet to the Price Dean search committee without talking to anyone in the other branches. I will say, the problem with these appointments, as someone who has gone through them before, is that they happen relatively quickly.
- **Representative Morgan:** Would you accept a friendly amendment to strike the mentioned section?

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- **Representative Toyos:** Yes.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** Authors are you aware that this bill is simply just written as a precautionary measure to avoid any discrepancies in future questioning of the legitimacy in search case?
 - **Representative Toyos:** Yes.
- **Associate Savage:** Why are we striking that section?
 - **ConAd Chair Morgan:** Well, if we read it, representatives of the search committee shall be nominated and approved by the chair of the Undergraduate Student Congress and the Chair of the Graduate Student Senate. That is not how advice and consent works. It requires a majority vote of both houses. So by leaving that in, we're effectively changing nothing.

- CB-115-21 "Vice Chair Revision Act of 2026" (Gilson-Bond) (Do Pass)

Author's Explanation:

Vice Chair Gilson-Bond: Alrighty. So all this effectively does there's just two points that are going to be changed. It's point number seven. The reason why I specifically changed this because I want to make it to where vice chairs are required to go to a few meetings. Obviously, not all of them because that's not very fair. But mainly two meetings excluding the executive committee meeting. So meaning that every Sunday, you you'd be required to go to three meetings, two committee meetings, and then obviously our normal required exec meeting. And then I also want to specify why because I think that's an important thing for future Vice Chairs to be able to look at it, be like, okay. This is why I'm specifically going to be going to these meetings, to be pretty much just remembering information. So if this ever comes up later, someone asks, I can be able to give that information specifically to them. Then I kind of moved down the section a little bit so you plan it like the way like it ended up going together because it's also just it looked ugly. So then I just made point A specifically. I'm talking about specifically helping pointed chairs. That the reason why that is because obviously if you're at the meetings, sometimes newer chairs don't understand necessarily like the whole procedure of chairing a meeting. So they're able to be there to be able to aid, that specifically. I've done that a few different times to where someone doesn't know how to do something, and I've been able to actually specifically help them, so we can make sure everything's kind of the same across the board. But other than that, I'm open to any questions.

- **Associate Savage:** What if a Vice Chair had obligations all day Sunday?
 - **Vice Chair Gilson-Bond:** Well, if they have obligations the whole entire time, then I kind of hope that they reconsider being vice chair necessarily. It's a very important thing actually specifically going to a few of those meetings. Obviously, there's workarounds and stuff. You can just, I guess, talk to them. But, I mean, that's up to y'all essentially. If you're like, okay. This isn't going to work, then you can take it out later. But hopefully, the next vice chair knows that, hey, Sundays are a busy day. I need be able to go to meetings. It's just two meetings. So regardless of those times. Sometimes they're during the week. I've seen times where ConAd meets during the week in the past, WAM met during the week. So there's times throughout the week you can go to meetings.
- **Representative Hawley:** Have you followed this every Sunday since you've been Vice Chair?

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- **Vice Chair Gilson-Bond:** I think there's been two weeks that I haven't gone to any meetings, but I've always been to at least two to three meetings. I usually, for the most part, am at EA because it's the first meeting of the day. There's been some times I miss because I'm just busy early in that day. I've been to a lot of UPol meetings. I've been to quite a few sustainability meetings. The one committee that I probably have not been to pretty much at all besides one time on Zoom because I was requested, was WAM. So, that's because they meet super late on Sundays, and I'm like, okay. I've been here since noon. Like, I need I need to dip. So, but yes.
- **Associate Blackwell:** Author, what is the penalty for not going to two meetings in one day?
 - **Vice Chair Gilson-Bond:** So what happens is there's, like, essentially not a penalty, but what happens is that whenever, like, later you're doing, like, no confidence votes, you can pretty much weigh that to be like, okay. Like, this is a responsibility that is outlined. Are we willing to forgive you essentially? Are you doing, you know, a great enough job in these other avenues to where we should keep you, or are we going to ignore you not doing the specific responsibility? So there isn't a punishment essentially, but if y'all decide a punishment, if you want them to continue being vice chair.
- **Representative Radzanowski:** Author, do you think there needs to be language outlined to ensure that the vice chair attends different committees and does not attend the same two committees week after week?
 - **Vice Chair Gilson-Bond:** So I don't think it means there needs to be specifically outline of that. I think that what happens if, like, you know, a specific committee chair is like, hey. Can you come to my meeting? Then, like, they know to go to that specific meeting. Sometimes, like, I mean, I'm a vice chair that came from sustainability. So, like, obviously, like, the one I'm probably going to try the most to go to each Sunday is probably sustainability. One thing I hate is whenever people become vice chair and they forget where they come from. So I want to make sure that I'm going to go to that that committee meeting. I don't want to outline that specifically because sometimes some committees need a little bit more help than other ones. So I don't want to limit them to be like, okay. Well, I can't go help this committee this day because I went there last week. So I think the main limitation is not counting executive committee meetings. Still a committee, but that's a required meeting anyway.
- **Representative Rhoads:** Author would you be open to a friendly amendment to Section 7 saying something about extenuating circumstances, just so people can't-. We've seen a Vice Chair no confidence before.
 - **Vice Chair Gilson-Bond:** If you provide the specific wording, I would be willing to accept, but I need the wording before I accept. Would you accept me countering that to you make it to where unless they notify the chairs in advance. I think that notification is important.

- **Representative Dailey:** What are the other commitments that vice chair like, what are your roles as vice chair? Just because I feel like y'all already have the required meeting on Sundays. Yeah, I was just wondering what the responsibilities are because I want to make sure you're not putting too much on the Vice Chair?
 - **Vice Chair Gilson-Bond:** I think it has to be required because so, like, starting, like, very first semester in the body, it is a very normal thing to where vice chairs don't go to committee meetings. I think that before I became vice chair at whenever I was in sustainability, I think the vice chair was at our meeting twice across two different vice chairs combined. And that is one that she just happened to be in the Conoco and we

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didn't have quorum, and she was just sitting there on her computer chilling. And she was just already there. And the other time was she got forced to go.

- **Representative Rhoads:** First of all congratulations, that’s so exciting. (*awkward) Anyways, obviously, the important part is working with your co-chair. What's one trait you admire about your co-chair.
 - **Associate Sneller:** I wanted Choncy as my co-chair as soon as I heard he was applying. Because I can be a bit abrupt, I know that. But Choncy, he's always so happy, and his energy is always so high. So he really helps balance out that part of me. So I know that when I'm dead from my big stupid STEM major, I know he's always going to be there to, like, keep the kids high, bring a little dance party.
 - **Representative Canady:** Every time I was interacting with Maddie, I was just like, you know, she knows what she wants. And that's something I really admire. Like, I'm always trying to be two different places or whatever, so I know if I am somewhere else that I shouldn't be like, Maddie's going to get me together. Like, she’s just on top of it.
- **Representative Savage:** Nominees, one have you just said that you're not very involved with congress, which I don't really understand. But because of that, that that brings up concerns.

Like, do you guys have any experience in the congressional body? And if so, how do you plan to use that to get members of CLA into congress?

- **Associate Sneller:** I'll start this one. I actually have a year now of experience, so that does help. I am now the Vice Chair HD, and I've helped write six bills now. So I do love writing legislation, and I think it's so important for CLAers' legislation because it gets them civically engaged. It takes them a lot to vote as we talked about voting. Voting is so important. So just showing kids that we can do it and then showing them that it's not as hard as it looks. It's really scary about legislation stuff at first, but once you get into it, it's not that bad. If you just push them to get into it, and then showing them you're there every step of the way, it's so much fun.
- **Representative Canady:** I also have a year of experience in SGA, and I am the Vice-Chair of COSCO. I would just let them know, being an associate this whole time, even though you're an associate, you still have a place in the body. You can do so many things, like bouncing ideas off each other and just really seeing a change on campus. Even though you're not voting in this place, here.

- CB-115-25 "Red River Holiday Act of 2026" (Martin/Edwards/Fort/Christiansen) (Do Pass)

Author's Explanation:

Chief of Staff Christiansen: As you may know, the students kind of get an unofficial holiday that gets to be appointed every semester. Over the past, I don't even know how many years, it's been cited as the Red River Holiday Act owing to the fact that this is usually designated as student holiday the day before the OU Texas football game which of course happens in October. So this would designate that day as that Friday before as a unofficial student holiday or unscheduled student holiday. So this has to go to Joe Harroz as president and then he submits it to the Board of Regents. So this is subject to their approval as well. This has been something that's been ongoing for at least past couple of years, this day in particular. And, you know, we believe not only is it, you know, just celebrating the tradition that is the Red River Rivalry, this also gives people a chance to go down, you know, to Dallas for the game safely, especially, you know, it's a busy traffic time down on I-35 so it just gives people an extra day to go down. Things like that. A lot of people already go down already that day so you know it kind of gives them more leeway especially in terms of assignments so they don't get tests assigned on Friday. Things like that.

- **Representative Morgan:** Author, were all heads of the respective branches of the legislative branch or bodies of the legislative branch consulted before the writing of this bill and when their names were put on the bill?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** Great question. So in all clearness I took this word for word from my templates that I was passed out to as chief of staff. So, you know, with some foresight, I definitely should have consulted. But, you know, I'm open to amendments to take people off or add people.
- **Representative Morgan:** Do you believe that this is the best day to have this? I mean, we've discussed in the past other days such as election day, which falls on Tuesday, November 3 for 2026. Do you believe that having that Friday out before the football game is a better option than the civic engagement that would take place during election day on November 3?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I don't know if there's a good way to say what's better. You know, I think different people have different interests. You know, I think, you know, the amount of students that end up going down to Dallas, whether it be to the game or just

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back to Dallas. You know we have a large student body population in Dallas as well. Around 40% are from the from the Dallas Metro Area. So I think that it kind of serves the general student body as a whole. You know? And as well I will add past you know congresses and administrations have tried to communicate with the Board of Regents about perhaps you know moving to election day or something to that nature. And the communication we got back from them which we don't believe would have changed is that, you know, voting is open from 7AM to 7PM usually. And so it's better, you know, students are able to get outside their class hours, things like that. Definitely something I talked about in UPol when this bill was seen is that we're definitely open to perhaps engaging in other ways, you know, specifically around election day working to bring a polling place to campus. You know, working with faculty and faculty senate perhaps to allow class excuses and things like that to go above things like that. So I'll to go back to guess where I started. I don't know if it's necessarily better but I think this is best to kind of serve students as a whole and address especially our tradition that we have here on campus.

- **Representative Wolthuis:** Similar to that, I'm wondering, do you know when they tried to pass election day as the student holiday? Was it an attempt to get it as an extra holiday or as the student holiday like what we do?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** As far as I'm aware, and George may know better, that it was an exchange. You know, we have one unofficial holiday. So I believe I don't think it was ever attempted to be passed. I think it was the negotiations with the board of regents that ultimately resulted in the past.
- **Representative Toyos:** Do you believe if we were to choose election day instead that OU Regents would still choose to give us the Friday of OU Texas off because of the demands of the students?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I wouldn't know. There definitely could be a discussion. And, you know, the Board of Regents are on a set term. So, you know, the turnover there could lend to it. I think we just as a whole, believe that the overall student body population is served in this way better.
- **Representative Rhoads:** Author do you think it might be better to wait and see this bill after the head of every branch were consulted?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I mean, we submitted this from the executive branch, and going to congress is, I think, our way of consulting Congress and GSS.
- **Representative Morgan:** Author, are you aware that in the board of regents policy manual, it only outlines the Undergraduate Student Congress and the Graduate Student Senate as the authority to recommend. So first of all, thank you for being up here presenting this. I appreciate you coming to congress to do this. But this is not an executive issue. So I think not consulting the Undergraduate Student Congress and Graduate Student Senate a grave oversight.
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I agree with that. I would argue that I'm consulting you right now by taking your questions.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** Author, do you happen to know what the procedure was in years past to decide on the Red River holiday?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** As was outlined in my transition documents, you know, I have the bill. I consulted with George, and he talked about that, you know, I consult with the body going through congress. It goes through Congress and GSS.

On a motion to extend time for questions by 10 minutes Gilson-Bond seconded Cox

- **Representative Wolthuis:** Do you believe that if you brought this forward in front of student affairs, in front of student life, in front of big exec as a whole with the other branch heads, it could have had a positive debate going forward and potentially advise the Regents to choose election day or kind of just go choose election day rather than Red River.
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I mean, I certainly think there'd be debate as we're having right now. You know, I think it was just it was our position that, you know, we believe that more students are being served by having the student holiday fall upon the day before Red River. And, you know, our goal is to address the student body as a whole. And so, you know, I think the debate is healthy and is definitely warranted. You know, and I think as we talked about other ways that we can address election day as a concern for students, making it more accessible for students are definitely things we want to do. You know, just kind of as a whole we felt that this was kind of the best way to address all of our students' concerns.
- **Representative Hawley:** Author I feel like you somewhat addressed this, but would administration ever be open to giving us more than one day to recommend, giving us two?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I guess that would, you know, that would be up to talks with the Board of Regents and president Joe Harroz. I will say that instruction time is a big thing in general with professors, you know, wanting more instruction time and things like that. You know, the calendar is already pretty compacted as it is. This is our one student holiday is the only day other than the day Thanksgiving break that we have off during the fall semester. That's purely just due to the instruction time. So, you know, Board of Regents and at the state level, they want to keep instructional times up. And so, you know, that would be a discussion to be had, but in my personal opinion, at least, I would see that as a hard thing to win.
- **Representative Hawley:** Could you foresee, per se, like, when we do higher education day, kids well, students get excused for that. Could you foresee, like because I know I do mail in ballot. I always do. But for students who either don't get in on time or don't do this, could you foresee recommending professors to do excused absences instead?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I think that think that'd be a good way to address, you know, two birds with one stone here. And that's something we talked about that we want to work on. First of all, getting more college students to vote, college students don't vote a lot. And second of all, making it, you know, more accessible for them to vote. Like I said, allowing, you know, students time to vote when they're able to.
- **Chair Robinson:** Do you think it's appropriate to say that this serves more of the student body when I would almost certainly say more students are eligible to vote than are capable to get tickets to OU Texas?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I think more people are eligible to vote. I don't think more people do vote. I would almost guarantee that. And so I think as a whole, people on campus are better served, you know, through this act. I do wish more people voted, of course, I vote. I wish more people were taking their their responsibility and the right to to exercise their vote. But, you know, on the whole, I think more students travel to the game or travel somewhere else. And this just kind of allows that to be done in a safer manner as we already talked about.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** Author, do you believe that with a day off of school and for student workers, there could be more people that would go out and vote as opposed to people who do do go to Red River?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** Like I said, I think it's a possibility, but, you know, it's it's one thing to give people time to vote. It's another thing to actually get them to vote. And I

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think as I kind of touched on earlier, polling times are open 7AM, 7PM. You know, that's I almost guarantee, each student has time to go vote between those times and allowing for class and things like that. And so I think first step would be encouraging those people to try and do that at those times.

- **Representative Vedra:** You said you believe that more people choose to utilize the holiday to travel than vote. Do you have any data to back that up?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I think you're mischaracterizing my words. I said I believe more people would use that day to travel than would actually go out to vote. And I'm not saying you have the chance to vote. Yes, if we give election day off, more people would have the chance to vote. I just don't believe in my own right. The national statistic, don't know it for college students but I know it is vastly lower than, you know, the national average for the amount of people that vote. I believe in the past election it was like 50 to 60% of Americans voted and for college students it's much lower. So I would argue, again I don't have hard data for this but I would argue that more people go out and travel or know, you use this day to go home, go to Dallas, things like that, then actually go out and cast their ballot on election day. Also, there is early voting options. You know, you only get one to two days to travel down to Dallas.
- **Representative Vedra:** Do you have any specific data on how many people travel or utilize that time loss to?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen: No.** I wouldn't have any specific data. But like I mentioned earlier, around 30 to 40% of our students are from Texas, and a lot of that is the Dallas area. So, you know, just on that on that fact, a lot of people would use, you know, the one time we get off of school other than Thanksgiving to go home.
- **Associate Savage:** Author, you talked a lot about the 7-7 time frame and how that kind of gives students the opportunity to go outside of class time, stuff like that. Would you agree that this game taking place on a Saturday kind of also gives students time to get down to Dallas? I know it's only a three hour drive.
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** Yes. But like I said, the traffic, you know, you know, likely with the amount of people going not just to the game but just to Dallas in general. Games at 11AM or 2PM I guess now on Saturdays. I think you can argue about time frame all day. But I would argue there's more time for people to vote. You know, like I said, early voting exists. Mail in ballots exist. Whereas, you know, if you drive down to Dallas, that's going to be a challenging time frame.
- **Secretary Wintory:** Author, do you think that the extra day and therefore, like, reduced congestion on the road the day of has a potential benefit to reduce you know, do as you said, reduce traffic, but also reduce accidents, reduce people's impetus to drunk drive, just generally improve road safety in a way that's very beneficial to the student body.
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I do.
- **Representative Morgan:** Author, do you believe students having an extra day to drive down to Dallas for a football game or election day is more important?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I think both serve different student populations. And I like I've said earlier, I think that more students are served through this holiday. Also, in addition, I think this is more likely to actually be adopted by the Board of Regents, and I think serving students that way as well is beneficial.
- **Vice President Nicholson:** Do you think that the overall student body would view it a negative way and think that we tried to take away the day off of school from them if we did in fact move it to election day?

- **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** I think everyone has their own their own view of it. But I think, you know, the Red River holiday has been a tradition for years and years now. I think, you know, students have gotten used to that and have planned around that. People have booked a hotels and Airbnb's around that. And that's why I think, you know, it financially impacts some of those students as well.
- **Associate Keupen:** Author, would you say that students are aware that Student Government Association gives the Friday before Texas as a student holiday rather than just a standard given?
 - **Chief of Staff Christiansen:** No. I don't think people would be aware of that, and I think people would assume that it's a given.

On a call for debate Rhoads seconded Morgan

- **Representative Rhoads:** I understand the purpose of this bill, I've been an author on this bill. I don't think there's anything inherently with the day being off for Eed River Rivalry. I think there's something wrong not addressing the people that you put as authors on this bill. That this should be a discussion between the people in those bodies. Especially the people like CAC who this legislation is not seen through so I think this should be addressed in Big Exec tomorrow.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** Yes. To piggyback what the former Chair just said. In this situation, we elect as a legislature our leaders to represent us in that room of big execs. That is an important room to be in, and we elected our chair for that purpose. I believe that the fact that it's not discussed with our leader, we should have an issue with. That should be a problem. Not necessarily because of the content of the bill, but because of the lack of communication between us.
- **Representative Hawley:** I kind of want to echo that, but on a different note of, like, I want to make sure everyone understands. I don't think any of us are opposed to everyone having that Friday. No. Everyone likes that holiday. Everyone just also thinks that a day to vote is very important as well, and it's not really ever given consideration. We all love that Friday off.
- **Associate Blackwell:** As somebody who's not from Oklahoma and not and not into sports, I really care less about this game, and I would much rather have a day to vote off.
- **Associate Frehde:** I like sports but I also think election day off would be important.
- **Representative Benitez-Mendoza:** I think its important to remember that as a Student Government we have an obligation to the student body to prioritize engagement over entertainment. But if we can only have one of them next semester, election day is more important because we have midterms. You guys have midterms.
 - **Representative Fisher:** I will admit I have a preference towards doing Friday, especially with the concern of like, the reason why we choose this Friday is because to make sure that, like, people arrive safely to OU, Texas. Correct me if I'm wrong, I think that's, like, one of the big reasons why we kind of chose that holiday. And I think if we are trying to move this off on Friday, that would increase the risk of danger that may not be ideal.
 - **Representative Nicholson:** Yeah. I would just say, like, with as mentioned, with the 7 to 7 time frame there, I think that that provides a plenty long of opportunity for anyone that truly cares to go vote, to get out there and vote. And I don't think that taking a day off of school for election day would draw out as much of a crowd to go vote when there's already that option, especially if it's already online. You could do it through your phone. I don't think canceling a day of school would do anything more than just give people a reason to kind of stay in and do nothing rather than go out and go vote.

- **Secretary Wintory:** In support of the bill. I just like to point out if the opponents gets, what it seems like they want, although they're a little divided on which day they actually want off. But if we don't have that Friday off, there is a very large potential for professors to put exams on that Friday, meaning people can't actually travel for the game on Saturday, which I don't know if anyone's ever made that drive to Dallas on game day. It's pretty horrific.
- **Vice President Nicholson:** This is the precedent. This is what we've always done. Students really appreciate, we talked to a lot of students and they love this day off. When they hear it comes from student government they are really happy. It's a great way to get them involved with Student government to talk about some of the other things we do. Election day is obviously very important, but there are other things we can do.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** So someone former mentioned that you could miss a class to go could also miss a class if you want to go down to OU Texas that badly. The other issue I have is we are ranked so incredibly low in civic engagement. And if we keep doing what we've always done, we should say that's never going to improve
- **Representative Radzanowski:** The role of student government is to improve civic engagement through all different means. That's what our committees do. That's the purpose of us being a part of this body. I think that a better use of our time would be to support initiatives that encourage voter registration, better education, and encourage active voters. I don't think that the best use of our time is to talk about OU Texas weekend.
- **Associate Bass:** A lot of concerns have been raised about placement of classes on these days that we could enjoy a holiday. I have serious doubts about many professors deciding to place exams for important events on the day before OU Texas. I have doubts. I'm not saying it's impossible. I just doubt it because they all want to they all want to see the football game too. They are also OU fans. We're talking about a tradition that doesn't hold any real serious consequences versus elections that do impact the lives of the people around us and ourselves.

(Martin/Edwards/Dunn/McNeal/Christiansen) (Do Pass)

Author's Explanation:

Chief Justice Dunn: Hi, everyone. My name is Tucker Dunn, the chief justice. I am once again presenting these nominations in the absence of the executive branch to present them. We interviewed we had about 12 applicants for the Superior Court this cycle, which was really good. I think we did a better job of advertising it around the law school especially. 12 applicants, six interviews, and then got four great nominees. We're very happy with them. If you all would want to introduce yourselves one by one, that'd be awesome.

Justice Sigle: My name is Lachlan Sigle, I'm a first year student at OU's Law School. I love it it here. I'm a lifelong Oklahoman, and I'm really excited to have this opportunity to be able to work with the SGA. Hello, everyone.

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Justice Duncan: My name is Thomas Duncan. I'm actually an undergraduate. I'm a junior accounting major. I spend most of my time with the Oklahoma intercollegiate legislator where I won the most recent moot competition, and I'll be an incoming supreme court justice to them.

Justice Talbot: I'm Trey Talbot, and I'm also a first year law student and the Oklahoma College of Law. I'm originally from Iowa, but I came out here for law school. I'm very excited for the opportunity to serve on the Superior Court.

Justice Dodge: My name is Rachel Dodge, I'm a first year law student. I graduated from OU last year, and I was pretty involved in undergrad. So I'm looking forward to giving back to OU through this.

- **Associate Savage:** Thomas, learning about this role, you are new to student government. Correct me if I'm wrong there. But you know you're very close with someone who's very close to all of us, the esteemed former WAM chair Jacob Schonfield. Can you please tell us a bit more about how his legacy has lived on through you and how you hope to keep that legacy alive in your role?
 - **Appointee Duncan:** thank you Representative. I wouldn't be here if it was not for a former Ways and Means committee chair, Jacob Schonfield. His influence is truly unspeakable in terms of how much it impacted me. All my thanks to him. It is it seems like he's passed away.
- **Representative Morgan:** Nominees, could you just go over some of your relevant experience to be a judge on this court?
 - **Justice Sigle:** Much of what I've done in law school so far has involved interpreting and applying the law such as governing documents like the SGA constitution or the SGA code annotated. And I think my experience working with applying governing documents in the law school sense will translate and allow me to apply them in this sense.
 - **Justice Duncan:** I already mentioned it. I'm an Oklahoma intercollegiate legislator. I was in the house of representatives. I won best freshman. And then this last session, I was in the Moot competition for everyone not familiar with Moot. What it basically is is that you have to read a bunch of supreme court rulings. All the facts of the case were agreed upon, so you just argue with the legal issue of it. It's a constitutionality issue. You do that before a panel of justices, and they determine who has the most persuasive argument. So I was lucky enough to win that out of 24 people. I'll be an incoming Supreme Court justice for OIL. Besides that, I worked for three plus years with the Oklahoma University of Oklahoma Police Department as an unarmed security officer, eventually becoming supervisor for the National Weather Center. Resigned last March, and all my other real time experience, but a lot of community service.
 - **Justice Talbot:** I wanted to be a lawyer since I was in seventh grade. I've been working very closely with attorneys, with judges, and in political fields for a very long time.
 - **Justice Dodge:** I'm in Law School I applied for leadership positions there. Also, I was big in OU Cousins in my undergrad years. So, we worked with some stuff regarding SGA and resources here at OU.
- **Representative Wolthuis:** Author, what was the process like selecting these nominees, and did you all undergo bias training?
 - **Chief Justice Dunn:** We did not undergo bias training I think for these. I think that's normally like the ConAd but we. Yeah, I've had mine. We all have undergone bias training, but we didn't, like, specifically do one for these this nomination process. Besides that, the process was we got the 12 applicants. We sent out an email explaining

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because we had some grad students and, like, fourth year students. So we sent out an email explaining the position was open starting next semester, and, apparently, that was a problem for a bunch of people. Half the nominees did not schedule interviews when prompted. And, yeah, we did the interview process. It was kind of a rotation. I think everyone except for me had, like, different obligations throughout the day. So people were, like, cycling in and out. But and then the decisions were made by a majority vote on the panel, and I'm only a tiebreaker vote. I don't think I had to break any ties at all for this. So pretty uniformly, like, these were all the favorites. That's how we came to these nominees.

- **Representative Rhoads:** Author, so is there a scoring system, or is it like a ranking system?
 - **Chief Justice Dunn:** It was ranking. Everyone submitted ranking. We're all, like, on an email chain together. Technically, those probably open if somebody really wanted to to inquire about it. But everyone had the same four nominees in their rankings. It was just different orders. And luckily, we had four open seats.

Representative Khalife: Hi I'm Maya Khalife, and we're presenting the Earth Day Sustainability Awareness Resolution of 2026. The Earth day dates back to 1970 and it was strategically placed Between spring break and finals week to increase engagement on college campuses everywhere. And Earth Day has a strong connection to universities and even more in Norman, where the first Earth Day was organizing involvement from pandemic. The goal is to build on that and make Earth Day more impactful. Right now there are a lot of sustainability efforts across campus for research student orgs, and events. CONGRESSIONAL BILL CB-115-21

AS INTRODUCED

An Act of Procedure amending the Congress Bylaws to reflect the necessary changes to the responsibilities and duties of the Undergraduate Student Congress Vice Chair; providing for short title, providing for codification, and providing for an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

- Section 1:** Title: This act shall be known and may be cited as the “Vice Chair Revision Act of 2026”
- Section 2:** Purpose: The purpose of this act shall be to amend the Oklahoma Student Government Association’s Undergraduate Student Congress’s Bylaws Section 4.2
- Section 3:** AMENDATORY: The University of Oklahoma Student Government Association’s Undergraduate Student Congress’s Bylaws Section 4.2 is amended as follows. For the purposes of this bill, all items removed shall be denoted with a ~~striketrough~~. All items added shall be denoted with an underline.

Section 4.2: CONGRESS VICE CHAIR

1. The Vice Chair is the second-highest ranking officer of Student Congress. The Vice Chair shall strive to facilitate the execution of Student Congress’ mission.
2. The Vice Chair shall advise and assist the Student Congress Chair on matters pertaining to the Congress.
3. The Vice Chair shall preside over general meetings and Executive Committee meetings in the absence of the Student Congress Chair and shall preside over the Committee of the Whole.
4. The Vice Chair shall organize and direct the orientation, as specified elsewhere in these Bylaws.
5. The Vice Chair shall write, organize, maintain, and update a Student Congress Handbook of resources as specified within these Bylaws.
6. The Vice Chair shall serve as the Associate Coordinator and shall work towards the successful integration of newly-appointed associates into Student Congress.
7. The Vice Chair shall be a voting ex-officio member of all committees. The Vice Chair shall attend no fewer than two (2) committee meetings per week , with the exception of the Executive Committee meeting, for the purpose of supporting committee operations, maintaining awareness of committee activities, and facilitating communication between committees and the

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Student Congress leadership. The Vice Chair shall utilize information gathered from these meetings to inform the Chair and other relevant parties as necessary. If the Vice-Chair needs to miss meetings for any circumstance, they must contact all committee chairs about their absence. The Vice Chair shall guide, advise, and assist the appointed Chairs of all established committees in their duties and responsibilities to the best of their ability. The Vice Chair shall report on committees as necessary to the Student Congress Chair.

8. The Vice Chair shall guide, advise, and assist the appointed Chairs of all established committees in their duties and responsibilities to the best of their ability.
9. The Vice Chair shall oversee matters of morale and personnel not otherwise specified within these Bylaws, including, but not limited to, logistics for food and transportation for Student Congress events.
10. The Vice Chair shall be required to complete no less than 8 hours of “office hours” per week in accordance with the monthly stipend awarded to the position. Should the stipend change, this section shall be amended to reflect the new stipend.
11. The Vice Chair shall be responsible for advising the Chair on all matters of communications and public relations on any of the Undergraduate Student Congress’s activities with or to the public.
12. The Vice Chair shall be responsible for ensuring that the Undergraduate Student Congress provides its members with at least two (2) Congressional Service opportunities occurring on at least two separate days of the week during the months wherein Congressional Service requirements exist. An Act of Legislation to amend election-related language in the Code Annotated; providing for short title, providing for codification, and providing for an effective date.

- Section 1:** Title: This act shall be known and may be cited as the “Spring 2026 Uncontested Elections Rework Act”.
- Section 2:** Purpose: The purpose of this act shall be to update the Code Annotated to rework the “Prefer not to vote” option on uncontested ballots, clarify its exact role, and expand the criteria for its inclusion. Additionally, a small change in wording will be made to clarify the proper deadline for infraction reporting.
- Section 3:** AMENDATORY: The University of Oklahoma Student Government Association Code Annotated Title VI Chapter 1, §8 and Title VI Chapter 5, §3 are amended as follows. For the purposes of this bill, all items removed shall be denoted with a strikethrough (~~strikethrough~~) and all items added shall be denoted with an underline (underline).

Chapter VI-1 General Provisions

1. **Uncontested Elections.** All positions for which one has filed for election, they must be placed on the ballot in the respective district, even if the position is uncontested. In an uncontested election, or elections where the number of candidates is less than the number of open positions, an additional option titled “No Candidate” shall be on the ballot. This option represents a direct negation against the candidate(s), not an abstention. The candidate shall win if they receive more votes than the ~~“prefer not to vote”~~ “No Candidate” option.

Chapter VI-5 Oversight and Enforcement

3. **Campaign Rules Infractions.** All complaints regarding violations of the SGA campaign rules shall be submitted in writing to the Election Commission within five (5) days of the incident which generated the complaint or within forty-eight (48)

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hours ~~of the close~~ following the closing of the polls – whichever is sooner. The Election Commissioner shall notify all affected parties of any grievance and allow the accused twenty-four (24) hours to submit a written response or request an oral hearing. The Election Commission shall make a ruling within one (1) Class Day after the accused has either made a written statement, after the oral hearing, or if they failed to submit either within the twenty-four (24) hour period. The Election Commissioner may not impose any points without the aforementioned hearing process.

- Whereas: The City of Norman holds historical significance in Oklahoma’s environmental movement, as the first Earth Day celebration in the state was organized in Norman in 1970 with involvement from the University of Oklahoma, establishing a longstanding connection between the University and environmental advocacy;² and
- Whereas: The City of Norman continues to commemorate Earth Day through an annual community-wide Earth Day Festival that promotes sustainability education, conservation practices, and civic engagement;³ and

- Whereas: The University of Oklahoma has demonstrated its commitment to sustainability through campus-wide recycling programs, environmental research initiatives, and operational sustainability efforts supported by the Office of Sustainability;⁸ and

A Concurrent Resolution recognizing the month of April
as Autism Awareness Month; and providing for

Whereas: Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a complex developmental disability that typically appears during the first three years of life and affects a person's ability to communicate and interact with others¹; and

Whereas: This condition affects an estimated 1 in 31 children and 1 in 45 adults in the United States²; and

Whereas: While autism can be reliably diagnosed by a specialist by age 2, the average age of diagnosis in the U.S. is 5 years; and

Whereas: Autism is a "spectrum disorder" that affects individuals differently and to varying degrees, often accompanied by conditions such as seizures, ADHD, and anxiety; and

Whereas: Only 21% of people with disabilities, including autism, are currently employed, highlighting a critical need for vocational support and workplace accommodations; and
