Committee Reports-

- **Campus Outreach, Safety, and Concerns:** COSCO met this week, great progress on our projects. Library hours project has died seeing as interest has been down for those hours. Congrats to Sidney May on her project.

Special Orders

- Presentation on CB-105-17 The Redistricting Act of 2021

Ownby: Redistricting presentation. Hopefully you've looked over this. Main changes, architecture remaining 1, atmospheric 1 seat, business now 4, finance now 4, communication same, Earth and Energy lost a seat, now 1, engineering same, fine arts 2 seats to 1 seat now. Humanities and Language district are merging. Combined 1 and 3 to make 4 Humanities seats.

Tesfaselassie: How is redistricting decided?

Ownby: We take the most current enrollment stats and calculate each district in the Bylaws, 500-1 representation.

Kerr: The two merged districts, they didn't take a seat away, what was the purpose of that? Ownby: Language is small, less than 200 people. Humanities district, within all the degree plans, and all those

require some amount of language. Thought it best to give broader rep to language district and allow

Humanities majors to represent language in those classes. We do have a language rep now, but that's usually a rare occurrence.

Thompson: Why was Earth and Energy reduced to 1?

Ownby: 219 total students, using 500-1 ratio, having 2 is overrepresentation.

Lange: Architecture had over 600 students last time I checked, so why is it just 1?

Ownby: 407 students. Freshmen get taken out of that calculation.

Hong: I'm the Language Representative. When was the last time this seat was filled?

Ownby: I believe it was a year and a half ago with Hunter Stack, he resigned a little bit into around 103. Another person came in and resigned quickly. Talking with other ConAd chairs, they've told the same story.

District that struggles to maintain a representative. Rosen: Will language majors be hindered in elections because of greater competition for Humanities seats?

Ownby: I don't think so. Humanities is full of a wide variety of degree programs. There are a lot of majors making up the total number so we're all in the same boat. I don't think this will hinder representation, it will actually increase it.

Grebe: Why can't we change UCOL?

Ownby: They have to equal ¹/₄ of the representation. Unless we change that with an amendment, we can't mess with that.

Marvin: Have you looked into communications district and if it falls into same thing as Gaylord? Ownby: I haven't. I don't know a lot about how they compare or differ.

Marvin: When I was running it was difficult to campaign because it's slightly different. Gaylord does a lot with Journalism, where other parts of Communication District are on other parts of campus.

May: Do you see Language majors with having an issue getting someone elected with the low number of constituents?

Ownby: No. There are many majors in Humanities and they don't have that problem. There are 3 seats with fewer numbers, but they're more spread out across campus. Humanities majors have language requirements as well.

Garg: How do you draw the line between Physical and Life Sciences? It can be hard to differentiate with hybrid majors.

Ownby: I'm not in STEM realm. Biology versus chemistry. I don't know science very well, lol. Hard to get the totality of every major in 16 districts. Grouping people who are similar enough sometimes happens. Sertovic: Why is IAS just one seat? There are lots of people in that district.

Ownby: They have 209 students in their district. Per the 500-1 rule, we left them at 1 seat.

Student Concerns

Weaver: Talking about this with Associate King and Rep. Beltz. On Elm, behind mail office. Not sure if that's on campus. There's not a single street light on that street, so when you're walking back to campus at night, it's really dark and you can't see a lot around you.

South: EA.

Poupore: Talking with students today, phase 3 vaccine. I felt like the email for that was a little late today. I looked at it, and by the time the email came there weren't any vaccines available.

South: I think there was an earlier email. Not sure if it was missed or spam. We should be getting more doses in the near future. For the time being, I can refer that to UPol, but not a whole lot we can do now. Weaver: Maybe there could be a day explaining what it means to lobby, not just an SGA issue, but could be open to students as a whole, maybe someone could run us through that.

South: Excellent idea. EA, y'all can work with exec on that.

South: It's astronomically hot in Physical Science Center Room 201. COSCO. Don't have to do a lot, I'm just complaining. I apologize for those of you here in person. I tried to find the thermostat. I couldn't find one. Lynksey: Pictures on social media of members of Congress at the US Capitol not wearing masks. We should be setting a good example.

South: We'll take care of that. COSCO. Wear your dang masks people.

<u>AB-105-03 Auxiliary Allocation 12 Act of 2020-2021 (Patton) (WAM, Do Pass)</u> Representative Poupore seconded by Representative Halsey-Kraus

Patton: Aux 12. Primary is due Friday at 5. Questions, let me know.

Harman: Describe what United World is?

Patton: International organization promoting international awareness. They organize some of the

international food events on campus.

Hong: FA lowercase the A in alpha?

South: Scriveners.

Poupore: Rundown on why funds are being allocated why they are?

Patton: 5 things we look at, biggest one fiscal history, range for if they're doing well increase, poorly decrease. Because one of the orgs had good fiscal, they got a bigger amount because they didn't receive primary from last year.

CR-105-06 Mask up 2.0 Resolution (Lynskey) (UPol, Do Pass)

Representative Poupore seconded by Representative Grebe

Lynskey: We're encouraging people to keep wearing masks get vaccinated, social distancing, keep policies in place.

Hillis: Saw something similar to this last semester. Did it get sent out by OUMM?

South: No, posted on website.

Hillis: Why are we sending this to the TX governor?

Lynskey: I mentioned him by name, would've been impolite to not send a copy.

Poupore: Co-author scriveners.

Grebe: Sending this to Greg Abbott, should we send this to OK state government?

Lynskey: Yes, FA adding names for distribution.

Grebe: FA adding OK governor Kevin Stitt?

Lynskey: Yes.

Tucker: FA co-sponsor?

Lynskey: Yes.

CR-105-09 Vaccination Appreciation Resolution (UPol, Do Pass)

Representative Garg seconded by Representative Tesfaselassie

Lynskey: Other legislation in UPol, tribal nations and OU Community congrats on vaccination efforts. Grebe: How have tribal nations been a crucial partner in vaccinations?

South: Tribal nations have been able to vaccinate people early. My tribe has been vaccinating all tribal

members phase 1, 2, and 3. Also distributing in rural OK and have been extremely helpful statewide.

CB-105-17 The Redistricting Act of 2021 (Ownby) (ConAd, Do Pass)

Representative Halsey-Kraus seconded by Representative Esmeraldo

Ownby: This is redistricting. ConAd looks at all our districts making sure our districts align with enrollment. A few changes, major one is merger of Humanities and Language District, felt it would be more representation for Language students.

Grebe: Confident that this distribution is as fair as it can be?

Ownby: I do. I gave the opportunity for people to provide comments and suggestions.

Cozort: How will this improve language major representation?

Ownby: In Humanities District, every degree program requires foreign language, so those individuals are side by side with the language majors. They'll be able to provide representation for both the majors as well as those taking those classes as their line of study.

South: Do you know how many constituents in Language District are double majored in Humanities? Ownby: I did a lot of research on that but I couldn't find an answer.

CR-105-07 Fail HB 1888 Resolution of 2021 (Beltz/Yanez) (EA, Do Pass)

Representative Esmeraldo seconded by Representative Poupore

Yanez: We have to send this back to committee. This House bill's title got struck. We have to send it back to committee because of that. If someone could make that motion, I'd deeply appreciate that.

Ownby: Was the title the only thing that changed?

Yanez: The House Bill being seen has not hit the floor yet.

Motion to Refer to External Affairs Committee Representative Grebe seconded by Representative Poupore

CR-105-08 Fail HB 2215 Resolution of 2021 (Beltz/Yanez) (EA, Do Pass)

Representative Tesfaselassie seconded by Representative Raymundi Pinheiro

Beltz: Two main reasons I'm bringing this forward. First, we want to protect First Amendment right to protest. As Communication representative representing journalists, First Amendment rights represent the Communications District. We want to fail this which gives a legal defense to those who run over rioters. Second, rioting has recently been defined and redefined and it can't not be abused. It prevents justice for injured protesters.

Flaggert: Due to the bill being on the floor, would you accept FA adding a specification stating 'as it reads,' so that it is reflective of how we see the bill right now, just in case if there are changes making the bill more workable, we're not having this bill go out saying we don't like a bill that we might actually agree with? Beltz: Yes.

Brown: Definition of civil disobedience in the first whereas clause, refusal to comply with certain laws. FA to replace civil disobedience with peaceful political protest?

Beltz: Yes.

Carmona: FA co-sponsor?

Beltz: Yes.

Janes: Language of the bill, under the belief that motor vehicle operator was under threat. Why is it immoral to defend oneself?

Beltz: My concern with HB2215 is that it expands legal defense. It's immoral to give leeway for the court to justify running over protestors. That's what's immoral, to backpedal and say it's defense.

Sertovic: FA co-sponsor?

South: President Farzaneh, VP Gray, and Chief of Staff Kaya, would you like to be co-sponsors?

Gray: I'll get back to you shortly.

Kerr: FA co-sponsor

Beltz: Yes.

Janes: Is it illegal to block traffic on a major intersection or street?

Broadbent: Yes. It's also illegal to run over protestors.

Garg: State exact language in the House Bill for more clarity?

Extend time for 5 minutes Representative Grebe seconded by Representative Garg

Motion to Recess for 5 minutes 8:22pm Representative Garg seconded by Representative Grebe

Janes: After everyone's had the chance to read the bill, recently, one of the main instances of this was in Tulsa. A family was in a truck, horse trailer attached. Family was surrounded and threatened to be killed. South: Do you have a question?

Janes: Why are we saying it's immoral to protect your life?

Beltz: It's immoral to expand this legal defense. That's the issue. We have self defense laws. Expanding it to enable abuse. Using it to run over people protesting is immoral.

Kincaid: In Section 2 of the House Bill, it states that a motor vehicle operator unintentionally running people over would be protected. This language says intentional. Why are we considering something different? Yanez: When you see someone in front of your car, there's no way to accidentally run them over. There's no

way this can be unintentional when you can clearly see them in front of your car in a protest. South: FA adding President Farzaneh, VP Gray, and Chief of Staff Kaya and myself as co-sponsor? Lewis: FA made in committee striking unintentional language.

Extend time 10 minutes Representative Grebe seconded by Representative Tesfaselassie

Janes: How do existing self defense laws protect drivers when they believe their life is in danger from a protest?

Beltz: Existing self defense laws, you can make a claim it was under self defense, we don't need another provision.

Garg: Has any attempt been made to define reasonable and unintentional interaction between motor vehicle operators and protestors?

Broadbent: To my knowledge, the language is being left ambiguous and vague on purpose. When the bill hits the floor, we'll have more answers. I can't tell you whether they will in the future to do that. Flaggert made an amendment to say as the bill reads currently. Right now, we don't know the answer.

Tucker: FA co-sponsor?

Beltz: Yes. Garg: FA co-sponsor? Beltz: Yes. Lynskey: FA co-sponsor? Beltz: Yes.

Follow-Up Reports

Lynskey: Hi everyone, student concerns last week about university COVID restrictions. Sat down with Dr. Bratzler to get context for fall decision. He told us that spring will stay the same regardless. Based on models, we'll be back to 100 percent capacity safely by August. US has seen less than 1000 deaths a day for two days now. Not good, but better. They haven't talked about requiring student vaccinations. Interesting modeling showing that mask mandates put in by Mayor Clark has helped to limit spread. He's said it's possible that based on each positive COVID test, there are between 4 and 5 additional people that are positive and never get tested, especially in college towns where populations are younger, and so more people have gotten it, so we're closer to something like herd immunity.

Marvin: Approval of communications director for exec. I met with her and Cricket about social media to rebrand OU SGA to be more specific about what each branch of government does. Excited to be working with her on PR.

Broadbent: House Legislation. HB 1888 is likely dead in the water, quote from rep. We likely won't see that resolution in the body unless we need to. Title being struck, whole bill being changed. Significant change to the bill. Spoke with Rep. Hilbert, VC of Appropriations. Budget is getting increase, not decrease, because donations to universities must be matched up to 25 percent by the state government. Third, me and Associate

Barnett were in the chamber when a bill about oil divestment was brought up in the House. The bill passed today prevents any university from divesting or boycotting oil.

Marvin: Resolution thanking everyone for Big 12 on the Hill.

Patton: 2 primary bills.

Harman: Might have HD bill, working on it.

CONGRESSIONAL BILL AB-105-03 SENATE BILL NO. GF20-XX

AS INTRODUCED

An act relating to appropriations; providing for short title; stating purpose; appropriating Auxiliary Funding for the 2020-2021 process; stating appropriation guidelines; establishing expiration deadline; directing transfer of unused funds by deadline; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION:

Section 1: This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Auxiliary Allocation 12 Act of 2020-2021"

Section 2: PURPOSE. The purpose of this act is to appropriate the funds of the University of Oklahoma Student Government Association to the organizations mentioned within.

Section 3: APPROPRIATION. The following amounts are hereby allocated to

CONGRESSIONAL RESOLUTION CR-105-06 SENATE RESOLUTION NO. GFXX-XX/GSXX-XX

AS INTRODUCED

A Concurrent Resolution encouraging the OU community to remain vigilant in the fight against COVID-19 by masking up and receiving a vaccine; providing a short title; and providing for distribution.

Whereas: The Co	OVID-19 pandemic	has adversely affe	ffected the life of OU	J students; and
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- Whereas: As of March 2, 2021, over 500,000 Americans have been lost to COVID-19 with over 28 million being infected¹; and
- Whereas: The continued use of face masks has been shown to reduce the spread of COVID-19²; and
- Whereas: The Centers for Disease Control recommends maintaining mask use and social distancing even as case numbers continue to decline³; and
- Whereas: A large portion of students attending OU are from Texas; and
- Whereas: Texas Governor Greg Abbott recently announced his plan to lift the mask mandate in Texas effective March 10th; and
- Whereas: The State of Oklahoma has never adopted a formal mask mandate, however citizens of Norman as well as students at the University have been advised to wear masks in accordance with local and university policy; therefore

AS INTRODUCED

A Congressional Act of Procedure amending districts per reapportionment, providing for a short title, providing for codification, and providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT CONGRESS:

- Section 1: Title: This act shall be known and may be cited as the "The Redistricting Act of 2021."
- **Section 2**: Purpose: The purpose of this act shall be to reapportion districts in accordance with the SGA Constitution § Article III, Section 2, Subsection 2.
- **Section 3**: AMENDATORY: The following section should amend the University of Oklahoma Student Government Association Undergraduate Student Congress' Bylaws § Section 4.1, Subsection 2. An <u>underline</u> shall be used to add text; a strikethrough shall be used to remove text.
 - a. ARCHITECTURE District: Shall consist of all students in the College of Architecture. This district has one (1) seat.
 - b. ATMOSPHERIC AND GEOGRAPHIC SCIENCE District: Shall consist of all students in the College of Atmospheric and Geographic Science, and all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Interdisciplinary Perspectives on the Environment Program. This district has one (1) seat.
 - c. BUSINESS District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the Price College of Business except for Finance and Accounting majors. This district has three seats. This district has four (4) seats.
 - d. FINANCE AND ACCOUNTING District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in Finance and Accounting. This district has three seats. This district has four (4) seats.
 - e. COMMUNICATION District: Shall consist of all students with the declared majors in the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication (including pre-Journalism) and declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Communication. This district has three (3) seats.
 - f. EARTH AND ENERGY District: Shall consist of all students in the Mewbourne College of Earth and Energy. This district has two seats. This district has one (1) seat.
 - g. INTERPERSONAL STUDIES District: Shall consist of all students in the College of Education and all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Human Relations, Social Work (including pre-Social Work), and all students in the University Outreach College of Continuing Education. This district has one (1) seat.
 - h. ENGINEERING District: Shall consist of all students in the Gallogly College of Engineering. This district has five (5) seats.

- i. FINE ARTS District: Shall consist of all students in the College of Fine Arts and all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Film and Media Studies. This district has two seats. This district has one (1) seat.
- j. HUMANITIES District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: African and African American Studies, Anthropology, Classics and Letters, English, History, History of Science, <u>Linguistics</u>, <u>Literature</u>, <u>Modern Languages</u>, Native American Studies, Philosophy, Religious Studies, Women's and Gender Studies, and Information Studies. This district has three seats. <u>This district has four (4) seats</u>.
- k. INTERNATIONAL STUDIES District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the College of International Studies. This district has one (1) seat.
- 1. LANGUAGE District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Modern Languages, Literature, and Linguistics. This district has one seat.
- m.LIFE SCIENCE District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Microbiology and Plant Biology, Health and Exercise Science, Biology, and Public Health. This district has four (4) seats.
- n. PHYSICAL SCIENCE District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Astronomy, Chemistry/Biochemistry, Mathematics, and Physics. This district has two (2) seats.
- o. SOCIAL SCIENCE District: Shall consist of all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Economics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, and The College of Liberal Studies. This district has four (4) seats.
- p. UNIVERSITY COLLEGE District: Shall consist of all students in the University College, including second year pre-Health Science Center students, Early Entry Students, and all students with declared majors in the following Arts and Sciences Departments: Multidisciplinary Studies. This district has twelve (12) seats.
- **Section 4:** This act shall become effective when passed in accordance with the SGA Constitution.
