Also, keep cameras on if you're receiving an answer to a question you asked. Rude to make person answering talk back to the faceless void. Resignations: Marvin from rep seat, Marleigh Merrell from associateship. Farzaneh, Gray, and Kaya want to let you know if you have anything you'd like to discuss, reach out to them directly. Student concern about frats and sororities parties, university is trying to take care of that. Spirited body, but please present yourself and the body professionally. Not like a suit or anything, but treat each other with respect and dignity, even in disagreement. We have several bills tonight, so we need to keep this in mind when we disagree with each other. Vice Chair's Report – Hope you are all doing well and safe. Big 12 on the Hill, we're seeing that resolution tonight, it's super lengthy with lots of research, thank you to EA for helping with that. Met with Farzaneh and Spigner, we made a Big 12 Boomer GroupMe. Me, South, Tucker, Farzaneh, Gray, Kaya, Spigner, and Broadbent. 22-24 February. 2 new PR team, Shaffer and Beltz. Having a meeting Thursday 3:15 on Zoom and in the Conoco, anyone's welcome. Expectations for semester. Talked to Gaylord professor, she's going to help us with press releases, etc. Also, resource guide on ENGAGE under documents. - **Congressional Administration:** I'm Foster, he/him. Overview for new members, we look over governing documents and Robert's Rules of Order. CB-105-08, previously failed appointment bill for elections commissioner, 45 minutes of questions, rec of no rec. CB-105-10, chief of staff appointment bill for interim CoS Kaya. Code Club 3:30 Sundays and 6:30 Tuesdays. Starting over next Sunday. People have a lot of interests but timing is an issue. Rep. Halsey-Kraus doing an amazing job organizing that. Student Concerns

Broadbent: After OU Daily article published about sorority in IGC from capitol riots, nothing has been done by that sorority, I'd like that to be followed up on. We haven't heard anything. I'd like them to have a statement about what they're doing moving forward.

South: We can contact them.

Griffin: Icy on campus. Hard to get around, very cold. Online classes Wednesday, but not sure about rest of the week. More transparency from the university to see if we have to stock up.

South: Last I heard, they're monitoring the situation. Haven't heard anything about the rest of the week. I'll update you all and ask higher admin to make info available ASAP.

Carmona: Student told me that some SafeRide drivers don't wear their face masks while driving.

South: George is SafeRide coordinator.

Old Business

CB-104-25 Fall 2020 Special Election for the Academic District Range Amendment Act of 2020

(Ownby/Hillis/Patterson) (ConAd, Do Pass)

Representative Esmeraldo seconded by Representative Merchant

Ownby: Passed last session, but we had to update it to the SGA Elections Commissioner since the old one resigned.

Grebe: Savannah's name still on this?

Ownby: It's good.

Broadbent: When will we vote on this? When will redistricting be?

Ownby: A week from when the legislation is signed. Dates will be put out and officialized. Redistricting has been done for awhile. It will be done ASAP after the election.

Items to Be Considered

CB-105-08 Act Appointing the Spring 2021 SGA Election Commissioner 2.0 (Farzaneh/Gray/Kaya)

(ConAd, No Rec)

Representative Grebe seconded by Representative Merchant

Farzaneh: This is the second time for this bill. 4 interviews last week. Nath has SGA experience, which is important. Representative, then associate, in ConAd, and Election Commission in 2020. Experience isn't the only important decision. Nath made it clear he'll support candidates in the process. Role is more than rules, it's being there for candidates in process that's emotionally draining. He will improve and serve in the role.

Only applicant who answered about rule of candidate meetings and brought up advice of General Counsel, committed to having 10 office hours a week. Invested in democratic process.

Nath: I'm Joy, he/him. Econ and linguistics. Enrolled in SGA since last semester, rep of social sciences district, associate this semester due to election commission and time conflict. I ran for commissioner because I'm a big believer in democratic processes. One big thing is I want to support candidates because they're running for something, not just brownie points.

Poupore: Last time, questioned about implicit bias training. Did you this time?

Farzaneh: No.

Patton: Talked about programming. If you were already serving on the commission, why didn't you do it before applying during your time on the commission?

Nath: Suggested it, but Chair Nees got the election details late. Bill was seen in GSS very late in the process. Didn't do them because of the strain of time and Chair Nees' resigning.

Broadbent: I asked Nath if he would stay as an associate in Congress for projects, but Constitution says that no Congress member shall serve in high office simultaneously. Will he still be serving in Congress?

Hillis: Election commissioner is a high office of judicial branch.

South: Knowing this will you resign, Nath?

Nath: I thought associate could still be in high office, but if not, then yes.

Poupore: Why didn't you take implicit bias training?

Farzaneh: Not a requirement. I'll stand by that there wasn't bias here. Implicit bias is important.

Patton: Detail about interview process and scoring process?

Farzaneh: Invited Hillis and Taylor for process.

Ext time by 10 minutes

Representative Merchant seconded by Representative Sertovic

Farzaneh: Scale of 1-4 for rating interviewees. Did basic math with it. Numerical process, 2 candidates averaged tied, Nath and Candidate 3. Then did application scores, and Associate Nath had the higher score and other qualifications.

Patton: Went back to review applications. Was that given to Hillis and Taylor?

Farzaneh: Yes.

Poupore: Can you go in on the numbers?

Farzaneh: Not sure that's relevant.

Patton: Hillis, can you speak on your interview process?

Hillis: Taylor and I were given the applications and scoring an hour before the interview process and stayed for interview process and put down final scores. Left the call after. Tie candidates, and members of exec reviewed applications without us on the call.

Broadbent: Did you do candidate most highly ranked by ConAd members?

Farzaneh: Interview scores, no.

Kerr: Who else was a high scoring candidate?

Farzaneh: Isaac Kabrick.

Broadbent: Biggest difference between Isaac and Joy for you?

Farzaneh: Joy had tons of ideas. Also only person interviewed who answered Taylor's question correctly.

Isaac said he didn't really have any ideas. I can go through those if relevant. That was deciding factor. Quality of applications, Nath's was exceptional.

Broadbent: Hillis and Taylor, why did you pick Isaac over Joy?

Hillis: I look at position of election commissioner as purely interpretive body. Candidate with best understanding of Constitution and General Council opinions. Joy has understanding, another that went through process has better understanding. I don't think that reciting facts is important. Knowing but also connecting them to big ideas is important. Won't speak for Taylor.

Patton: Hillis and Farzaneh, speak to if Joy is the candidate with most knowledge of the Code?

Farzaneh: Election process is scary, more than just the Code. Supporting candidates is important as well.

Other applicants could've done great, but out of the four Joy was most qualified.

Patton: Did Joy have most knowledge of the Code?

Farzaneh: Not sure how to define that, but confident that he has the sufficient knowledge.

Gray: Another author, I was impressed by Joy's knowledge about the Code. Like Foster said, knowledge isn't only important thing, but it's how you can use it to support candidates with big ideas.

Hillis: Past answer summed my answer up. Other candidate was better at connecting themes.

South: Is he competent?

Farzaneh: Yes.

Gray: Yes, absolutely.

South: Hillis, is the candidate competent?

Hillis: I will not answer that. This is advice and consent and I don't have a vote in the body to advise that they don't like candidate or consent that they do.

CB-105-10 An Act Appointing the Chief of Staff of the Executive Branch of 2021 (Farzaneh/Gray) (ConAd, No Rec)

Representative Grebe seconded by Representative Sertovic

Farzaneh: Appointing Cricket Kaya as Chief of Staff. She's been working as interim. She's incredible, doing such a good job. I'm very excited to appoint her in this role.

Kaya: I'm Cricket, she/they. I've been part of the campaign for awhile now. It would be an honor to lead those initiatives, thank you for inviting me today.

Lynskey: Hillis, can you explain why rec of no rec?

Hillis: ConAd only gives rec of no rec for appointment bills. It's not our decision to interview the candidate solely, it's up to the body. Only rec of no rec and do fail. We want the body to decide on its own.

Grebe: What has Cricket accomplished so far?

Kaya: I've been preparing for cabinet, helping with applications and interviews, and writing cabinet guide, platform points, letting them know how to talk to people, helping members with compassion. Working to revamp SGA IG so students can go for all things OU. Working hard for collab with other branches to organize before we get started.

CB-105-09 No Spring Break, But Here's an Election Act of 2021 (Hillis/Taylor) (ConAd, Do Pass)

Representative Esmeraldo seconded by Representative Poupore

Taylor: Hi, I'm Coy Taylor, member of ConAd, he/him. No spring break this year, we had an issue with the Code, it's set off spring break and there's no spring break. We looked at date from last year and set it two weeks back. March 29 and 30.

South: What is the Code Annotated?

Taylor: The Code is number 2 in governing documents. Constitution, Code, Bylaws. Code is more in depth than Constitution and outlines rules and procedures. Come to Code Club on Sundays and Tuesdays if you want to learn more.

Harman: How are elections usually set?

Taylor: Normally, Code sets fall election based on 11th academic week. Spring, 2 weeks after spring break. Took decision to look at where spring break was supposed to be and set dates accordingly.

CR-105-03 Higher Education Day Resolution of 2021

(Broadbent/Marvin/Grebe/Rosen/Beltz/Janes/Yanez/Kincaid) (EA, Do Pass)

Representative Griffin seconded by Representative Esmeraldo

Grebe: Introducing agenda for OK State Legislature next Tuesday for Higher Ed Day. Talking points for Board of Regents. Reasons for funding, STEM support, concurrent program, OK Promise, etc. Funds requested halfway through resolution. This resolution is more unofficial this year and we can talk about more issues to college students. Other issues include weapons on campus, SB about rape kits, LGBTQ+ discrimination, and free speech on campus. I'm not familiar with some parts of this resolution, so I'll yield to them on some points.

Hillis: Why are we not distributing this bill?

Broadbent: Letting new members write legislation, so it was left off accidentally. I can propose the FA to distribute.

Halsey-Kraus: Change things for FA from Hillis?

Grebe: Yes.

Broadbent: FA adding section 10, copies distributed to OU office of gov affairs, president Farzaneh, dept of exterior, house leadership, senate leadership, and governor Stitt?

Grebe: Yes.

CR-105-04 Big XII Big Responsibilities Fulfilled Resolution of 2021

(Marvin/Poupore/Griffin/Barnett/Koch/South) (EA, Do Pass)

Representative Grebe seconded by Representative Griffin

Poupore: This is Big 12 on the Hill legislation. Many co-authors, you can direct questions to any of them.

Broadbent: FA with sponsors?

Esmeraldo: International students, travel ban whereas clause, are there any other international student clauses?

Poupore: I didn't write that section. Marvin?

Marvin: One thing we wanted to focus on as a concern, last semester there was concern over being deported, and we wanted to make sure international students were protected, they're a great benefit to United States and we want to make sure they're protected while they're here. Making sure that you're essential travellers.

Hillis: A lot of footnotes in the text, but no footnote citations at the bottom of pages.

South: Microsoft Word error, scriveners. Should appear on the text.

Hillis: Why are we sending this to Chair Spigner when his position is events based?

Marvin: Included him because he's coming with us and he will need a copy. Wanted to include Chair Spigner too.

Hillis: Aware that Broadbent is keeping list of sponsors and that Vice Chair Marvin's title is just Vice?

Poupore: Aware now.

CONGRESSIONAL BILL CB-104-25
SENATE BILL NO. GS21-02

AS INTRODUCED

A Congressional Act of Legislation
establishing a special election for a
Constitutional Amendment; providing for
distribution; providing short title; and
providing an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA STUDENT GOVERNMENT
ASSOCIATION UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT CONGRESS:

Section 1: Title: This act shall be known and may be cited as the “Fall 2020 Special Election for the Academic District Range Amendment Act of 2020”

Section 2: Purpose: The University of Oklahoma Student Government Association’s (UOSGA) Undergraduate Student Congress and Graduate Student Senate passed the “Academic District Range Amendment of 2020” (CB-103-30, GS20-22). The amendment was passed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of each House of the Legislative Branch in accordance with the Constitution, and now requires a vote by the whole SGA.

AS INTRODUCED

A Congressional Resolution Calling for Legislative
Change in Higher Education Policy and Policy
Relating to College Students in the United States

- Whereas: According to a 2019 report sponsored by the State Chamber Research Foundation, for every dollar of state appropriations invested, the Oklahoma state system of higher education generates \$9.40 in economic output; and
- Whereas: More than half of the jobs on Oklahoma's Critical Occupations list require a college degree; and
- Whereas: A student with a college degree will earn \$1.1 million more over a lifetime than a high school graduate; and
- Whereas: Professions that require degrees in the STEM field, such as engineers, are in high demand in Oklahoma. Degree and certificate production in critical STEM disciplines has increased 54% over the last nine years; and
- Whereas: The Oklahoma Board of Regents has put forth a budget need proposal for the 2022 fiscal year; and
- Whereas: The components of this funding request will further the development of Oklahoma's workforce, address ongoing operational and campus improvement needs of colleges and universities, and support students through targeted scholarships and financial aid; and

- Whereas: Concurrent enrollment reduces the cost of attending college for students, increases college graduation rates, shortens the time-to-degree for students, and improves college-going rates and retention rates; and
- Whereas: To fully fund the concurrent enrollment program for high school seniors and juniors, The Board of Regents is requesting an additional \$4 million investment for this highly successful program; and
- Whereas: The state system of higher education strongly supports the Oklahoma’s Promise scholarship program, which provides funding for approximately 10% of the student population at the University of Oklahoma³; and
- Whereas: Nearly 90% of Oklahoma’s Promise graduates stay in Oklahoma and are employed in Oklahoma after college graduation; and
- Whereas: State Regents’ data show the service of OneNet, the sole provider of internet connectivity to state higher education institutions, equates to approximately \$6.4 million annually in systemwide savings; and
- Whereas: OneNet provides cost-effective connectivity services to state agencies, K-12 school districts, libraries, career technology campuses, hospitals, and tribal agencies; and
- Whereas: The Endowed Chair Program establishes state funds as a match for private donations for endowed chairs, distinguished professorships, visiting professorships and lectureships; and
- Whereas: The Board of Regents is requesting approximately \$10.42 million to support the payment of debt service to cover the \$161 million backlog of accounts awaiting state matching funds through the Endowed Chair Program; and
- Whereas: Higher education’s Fiscal Year 2022 budget request is based on four key areas:

Whereas: Under the current law, college and university presidents have the discretion to authorize the carrying of weapons on campus when the individual circumstances warrant it; and

Whereas: 84% of female survivors report being sexually assaulted during their first four semesters on campus; and

Whereas: Only 12% of college student survivors report the assault to police;⁴ and

Whereas: There are about 7,270 rape kits that have gone untested in the state of Oklahoma and in Oklahoma, victims are not granted the right to notice;⁵ and

Whereas: The Oklahoma State Senate Public Safety committee passed SB16 which allows for

the Oklahoma Crime Victims Compensation Board access to written documentation contained in the kits necessary to establish eligibility for resources;⁶ and

Whereas: Nearly half of all bisexual men and 4 in 10 gay men have experienced a type of sexual violence besides rape in their lifetimes. Additionally, nearly half of all bisexual women and one in eight lesbian women have experienced rape in their lifetimes;⁷ and

Whereas: In *Bostock v Clayton County, GA* the Supreme Court ruled that LGBTQ workers ought to be protected on a national level;⁸ and

Whereas: There is no legislation protecting LGBTQ students in Oklahoma from discrimination;⁹ and

Whereas: Oklahoma colleges and universities have imposed speech codes on students and student organizations that prohibit their Constitutional right to assemble, speak freely, and invite speakers to their campuses; and

Whereas: The Foundation for Individual Rights in Education 2020 Rankings for Free Speech on College Campuses ranked Oklahoma schools the lowest among 55 schools across the country;¹⁰ and

Whereas: Disdain for controversial student organizations has also led to threats of revoking funding and registration status, based on the ideas organizations hold or the speakers they wish to bring to campus, which is an unconstitutional act;¹³ and

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT CONGRESS:

Section 1: The Oklahoma State Legislature should adopt the budget need proposal put forth by the Board of Regents for the 2022 fiscal year for funding in higher education; and

Section 2: The Oklahoma State Legislature should invest an additional \$4 million into the concurrent enrollment program; and

Section 3: The Oklahoma State Legislature should maintain its funding to the Oklahoma’s Promise scholarship program; and

AS INTRODUCED

A Congressional Resolution Addressing Concerns for
Federal Legislators; and providing for distribution.

Whereas: Public universities who receive federal funding are required under Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 are required to make all buildings accessible to people with disabilities¹; and

Whereas: Universities are to make every effort to provide for people with disabilities when buildings are unable to be structurally rebuilt¹; and

Whereas: Adult dependents claimed on their parents' 2019 tax returns were excluded from every stimulus bill and ineligible for economic relief²; and

Whereas: There are 13.5 million adult dependents in the United States, and 54% are college students²; and

Whereas: An analysis by the People's Policy Project found that 2.3 million adult dependents, despite being in the lowest income category, were not able to receive stimulus checks²; and

Whereas: Research done in October by AIG Retirement Services and EVERFI indicated 38% of college students are worried they will not have enough money to cover expenses and 40% would not be able to afford a major unexpected expense³; and

Whereas: The proposed Heroes Act in May 2020 made provisions to include stimulus checks for adult dependents⁴; and

Whereas: Additionally, the Heroes Act would allow adult dependents to be eligible to receive the original \$500 or \$1200 stimulus checks⁴; and

Whereas: On Oct. 1, 2020 Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Andrew Wheeler granted a request by Oklahoma Governor J. Kevin Stitt for control of environmental regulations on tribal land on a wide range of issues, including the dumping of hazardous wastes, underground injection control (fracking rights), and the protection of major agricultural polluters⁵; and

Whereas: On July 9, 2020 the Supreme court reversed its original *McGirt v. Oklahoma* decision, effectively stating that the United States Federal Government does not have jurisdiction over tribal lands⁶; and

Whereas: Granting the Environmental Protection Agency control over tribal lands effectively reverses this decision, and threatens the sovereignty of tribal nations⁵; and

Whereas: The University of Oklahoma is uniquely situated in its location, being surrounded by Chickasaw lands to its south, Creek and Seminole lands to its east, and Choctaw lands to its southeast⁷; and

Whereas: The University of Oklahoma native student population is 4 times that of the national average⁸; and

Whereas: The eligibility requirements for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Programs (SNAP) across the country are far too restrictive for students⁹; and

Whereas: Food insecurity plagues about 30% of college students currently, and tuition is rising while financial aid is decreasing⁹; and

Whereas: If the unemployment rate averages 10.5%, and the poverty rate averages 14.4%, then 50 million people would face food insecurity⁹

Whereas: Student food pantries are far too unavailable for students to access their resources on a reasonable basis⁹; and

Whereas: Universities and colleges across the nation do not have enough food options for students, and they are generally promoting an unhealthy lifestyle by restricting options⁹; and

Whereas: International students are not considered essential travelers during the pandemic and were almost deported due to the pandemic; and

Whereas: International students brought in \$45 billion to the United States economy in 2018 and are beneficial to the economy¹⁰; and

Whereas: International students have established lives, connections, and jobs in the United States during their time in the country; and

Whereas: At the University of Oklahoma, there are 18 counselors and 2 psychiatrists in place to serve a student population of roughly 28,000 students¹¹; and

Whereas: Recent research indicates that 71% of college students have experienced increased stress and anxiety from the Coronavirus pandemic¹²; and

Whereas: The conclusion drawn from this study highlights that interventions and increased mental health resources are imperative for college students¹²; and

Whereas: The minimum wage in 2000, adjusted for inflation was \$7.51, while the minimum wage today is \$7.25¹³; and

Whereas: The average cost yearly cost of attending a 4-year public university in 2000, adjusted for inflation, was \$13,018 while the cost today is \$21,422¹⁴; and

Whereas: Students are working more hours for less money, taking out more loans, and possessing less disposable income, hurting their personal finances as well as local, state, and national economies; and

Whereas: Increasing the minimum wage will help to alleviate financial burdens on students; and

Whereas: Tuition rates at private institutions has risen by 3.3% in 2019-2020. Tuition rates at in-state public institutions have risen by 2.6% in 2019-2020. Tuition rates at out-of-state public institutions have risen by 2.5% in 2019-2020¹⁴; and

Whereas: The changes to Title IX in May 2020 do not serve to protect survivors of sexual assault and do not take into account changes to education during the pandemic¹⁵; and

Whereas: Changes to the policy included a live hearing that allows for a live-hearing where both parties can cross-examine each other¹⁵; and

Whereas: This move has the potential to deter survivors from coming forward¹⁵; and

Whereas: This change also narrowed the definition of sexual assault, and does not cover online forms of sexual harassment¹⁵; and

Whereas: Given a significant portion of education occurs online, these changes to Title IX do not adequately protect survivors and students and ensure their safety¹⁵.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT CONGRESS THAT:

Section 1: Title: This resolution shall be known and may be cited as the “Big XII on the Hill Lobbying Agenda.”

Section 2: The United States Federal Government ought to evaluate the compliance of universities that receive federal funding with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 to ensure that people with disabilities have readily equal access to all buildings on campus.

Section 4: The United States Federal Government shall seek to pass the Heroes Act of 2020, providing for stimulus checks for adult dependents, and in order to ease the financial stress and burden on college students during the Coronavirus pandemic.

Section 5: The United States Federal Government ought to respect the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in *McGirt v. Oklahoma*, by stripping the Environmental Protection Agency of any control over tribal lands.

Section 6: The United States Federal Government shall seek to expand SNAP eligibility, increase the operational scope of university food pantries, and promote an increase of foodstuff options at universities and colleges.

Section 7: The United States Federal Government ought to consider international students essential travelers and further protect their ability to reside in the United States to study.

Section 8: The United States Federal Government shall seek to increase funding and resources for mental health resources in order to combat the growing mental health crisis among college students.

Section 9: The United States Federal Government ought to work to make college more affordable and increase the minimum wage, alleviating financial burdens on college students.

Section 10: The United States Federal Government ought to promote equity in education by furthering affirmative action efforts and increasing the number of federal grants and scholarships available to all students.

Section 11: The United States Federal Government shall seek to reverse the May 2020 changes to Title IX policy in an effort to protect survivors of sexual assault and harassment and account for changes in online education delivery.
